
# ANNUAL ASSEMBLY RECOGNIZES EXCELLENCE




## SENIORS END THE DAILY ROUTINE








# THIRD TIME IS CHARM FOR CLASS NIGHT




tion, magically brought life to the words with the accompaniment of sign language.















# VOCAL STUDENTS INCREASE REPERTOIRE



















# TARTANS MARCH AFTER 19 TROPHIES














# TEAM TESTS KNOWLEDGE AGAINST AREA SCHOOLS

test their academic knowledge over a wide range of questions.







Sharpshooter Frank Butler, portrayed by Darren Fain, aims his shot through a mirror in a shooting contest with Annie Oakley.











# EXCHANGE STUDENTS ENHANCE CULTURAL AWARENESS











# PORTSMOUTH EAST REGAINS RIVER DAYS TITLE WITH DAWN WHITE'S CROWNING



The Tartans established a passing game season. An offense that was lifeless early in the season established itself by averaging 27 points per game for the last three games.


Interest in the football program was up, re-


Valuable experience was gained due to the number of underclassmen that played this season. The squad will have thirteen seniors returning to the 1983 season, which should be an important key to success.


**East 21 Green 6**












Sophomore Steve Foell, a first-year member, concentrates on his shot with a low score of 45 this season.








### ABILITY AND DETERMINATION BREAK MID-SEASON SLUMP




DESPITE TEAMWORK AND DETERMINATION, THE WINNING REMAINED JUST OUT OF REACH


































# SIX ADVANCE TO REGIONALS












### RELAY TEAMS ADVANCE TO REGIONALS






















