Wheelersburg High School owes much to the administration of our system. The members work together to keep the various school functions operating smoothly and efficiently.

As Scioto County Superintendent of Schools, E. R. McCowen is the official head of the school system. Arthur Preston, Superintendent of Wheelersburg Schools, is in charge of school personnel, advises in preparing the budget, and oversees school supplies. In addition to this, he controls government sponsored programs, seeing that certain federal funds are put to proper use.

Student policy and school activities are under the control of Edward R. Hall, principal. He is a helpful advisor to both the faculty and students.

The Board of Education acts on the advice of Mr. Preston in hiring and dismissing personnel. The five members of this group appropriate funds and provide for general maintenance of the building and grounds. This year the board provided for black-topping the teachers' parking lot and also supplied funds to establish a new student parking lot.

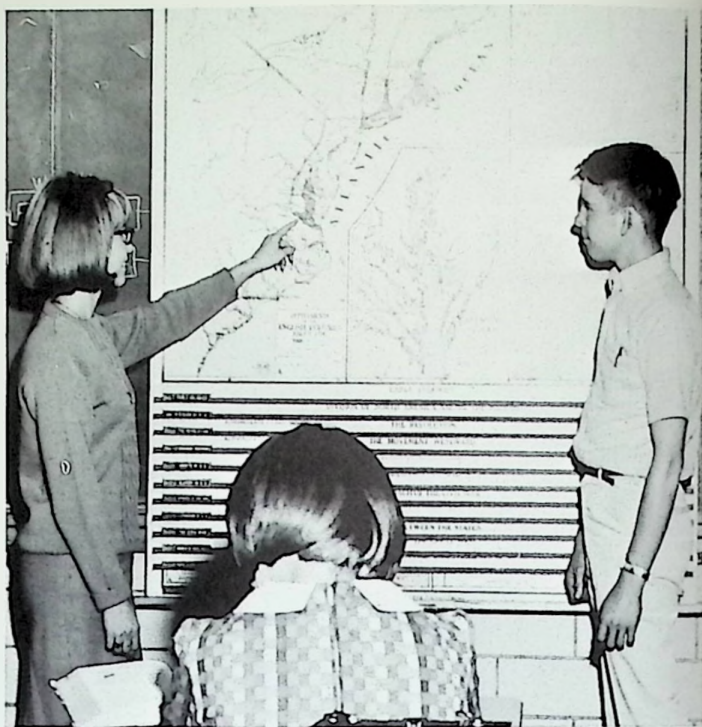
The expression of thought in a meaningful way makes the study of our own language imperative. Through English, correct forms are learned, while speech teaches better verbal communication.

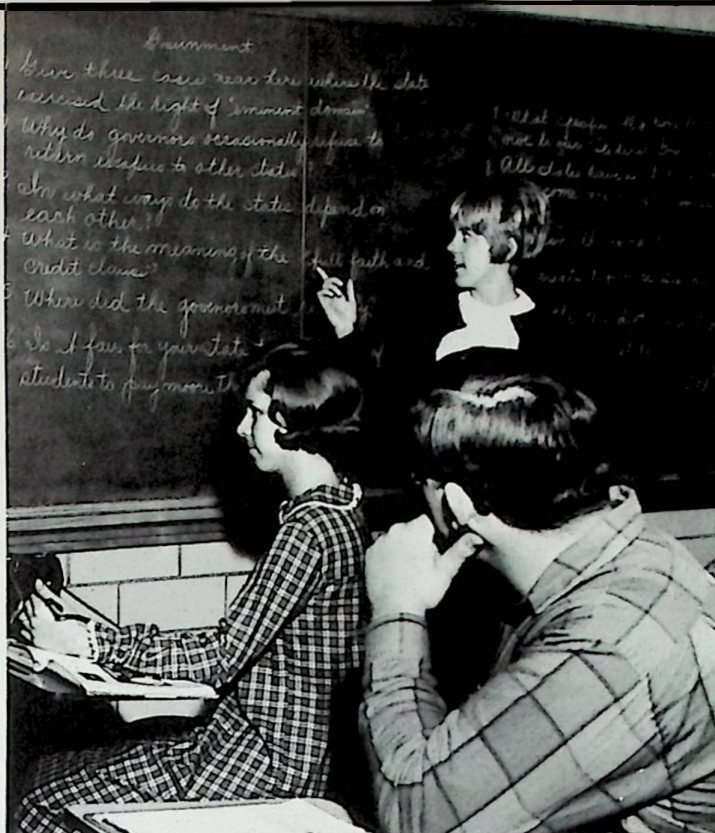

The students learn how their country is being operated in comparison with the governments of other countries. They learn the mistakes and accomplishments of the past which help them in making decisions today.

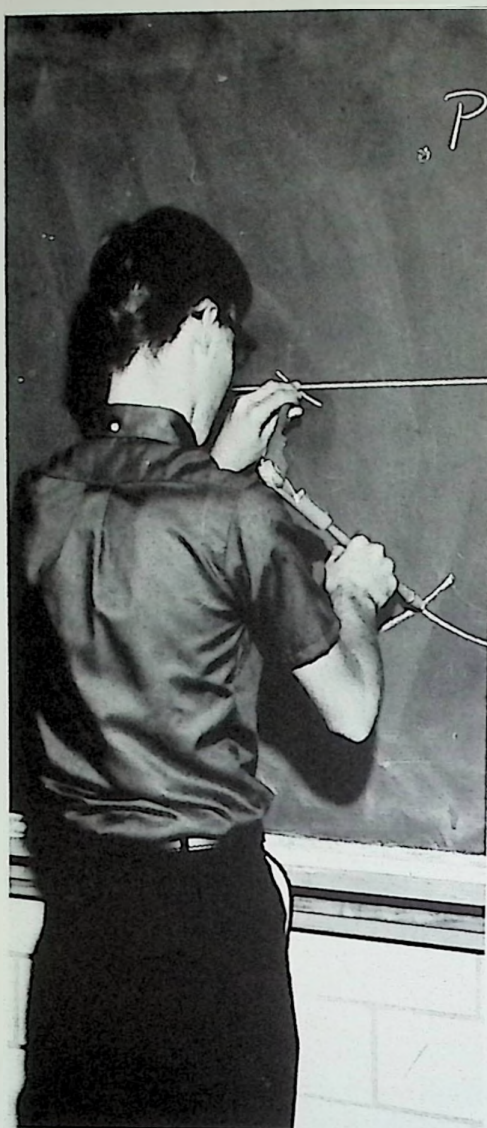

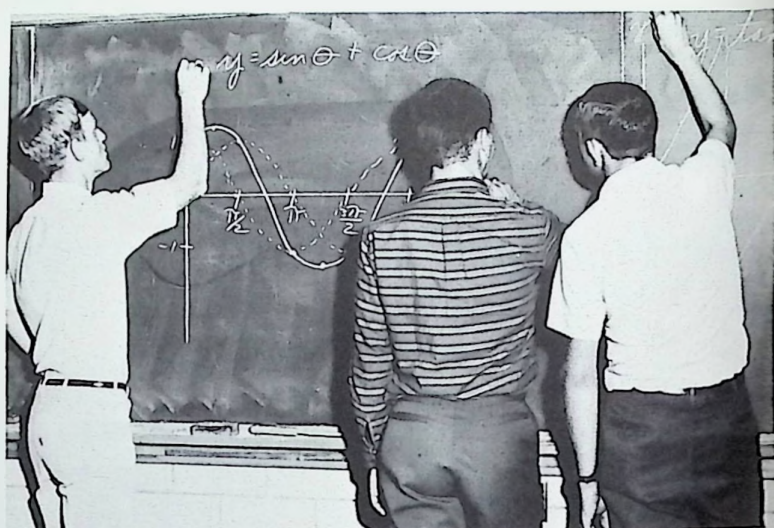

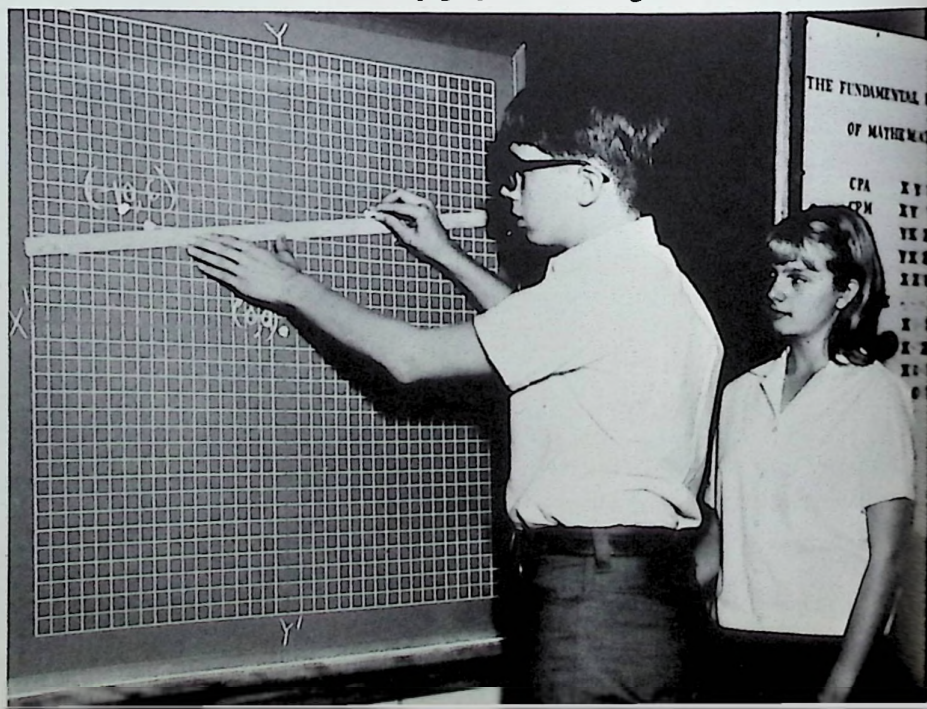

Theories Of Math And Science Are Applied To The Future

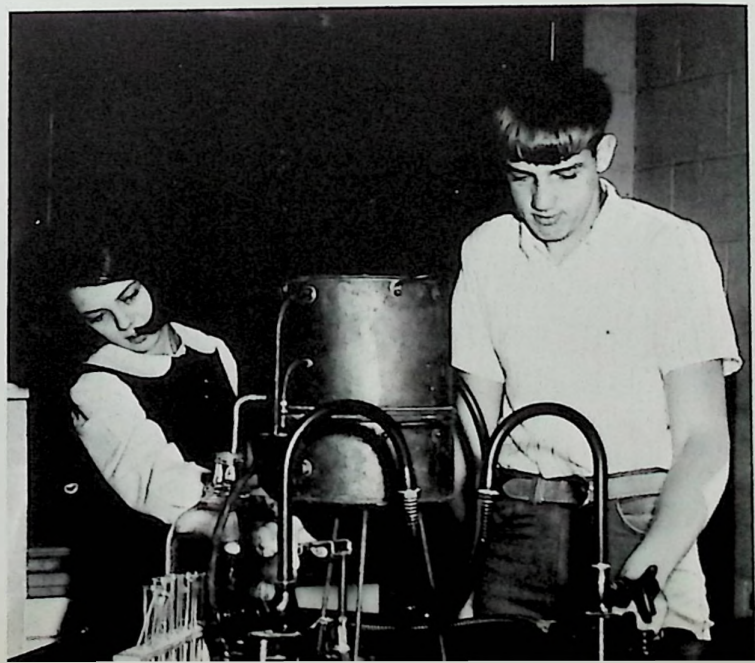


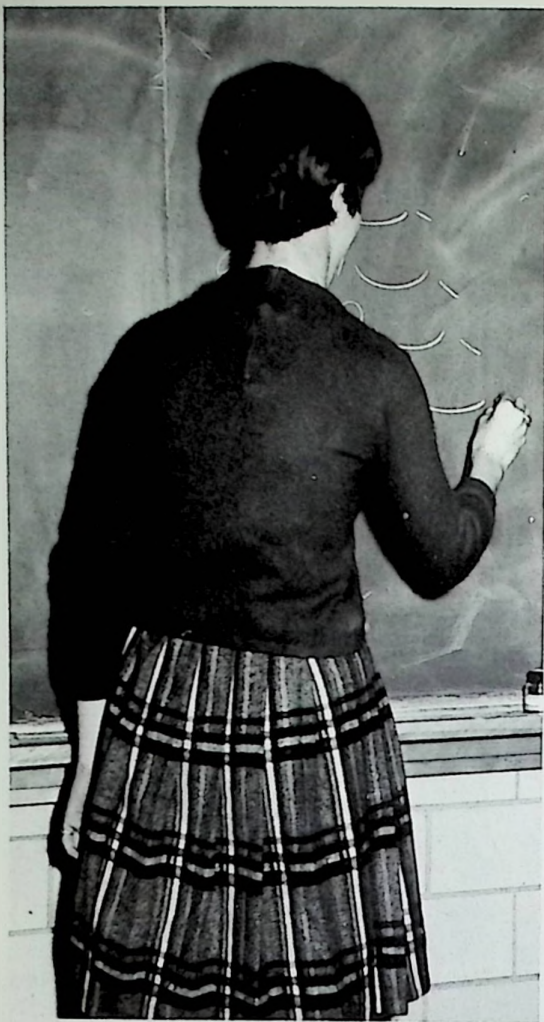
In biology, student teacher, Mrs. Elam, describes plant characteristics.

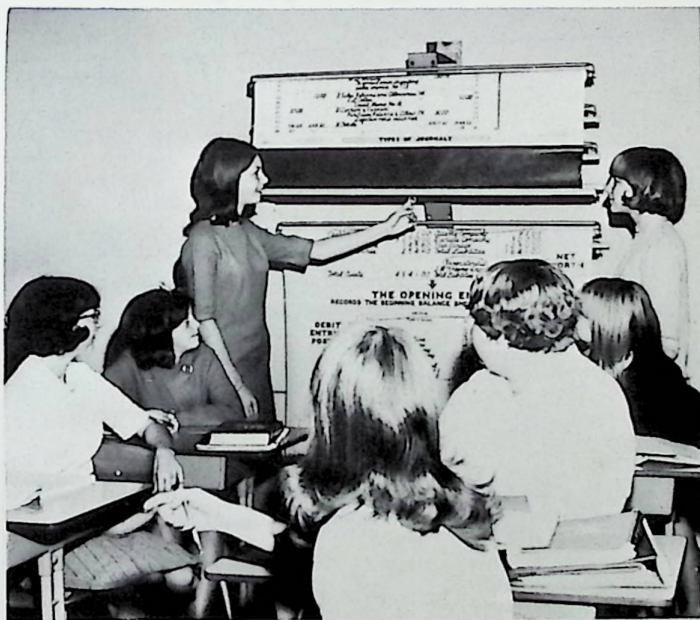
The courses included in the commercial department are bookkeeping, general business, typing, shorthand, business English, business law and office practice.

Also, after school hours, a new course was offered which teaches the operation of office equipment and bookkeeping.

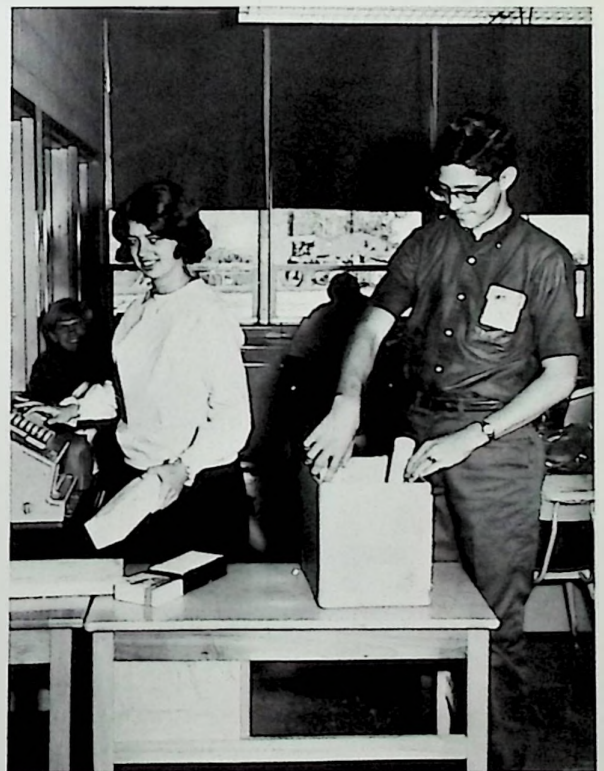
In addition, new equipment has been installed to give students actual practice toward future careers.

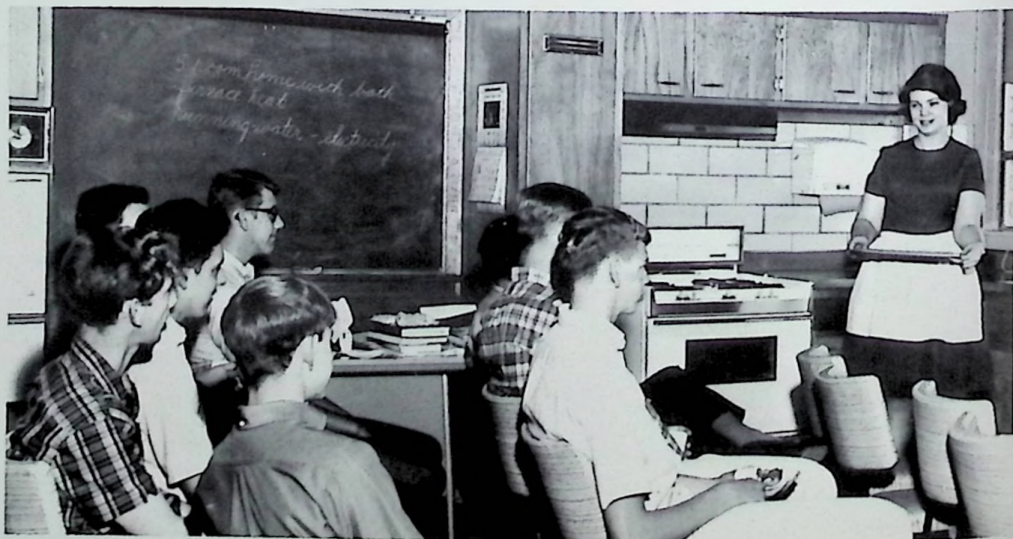

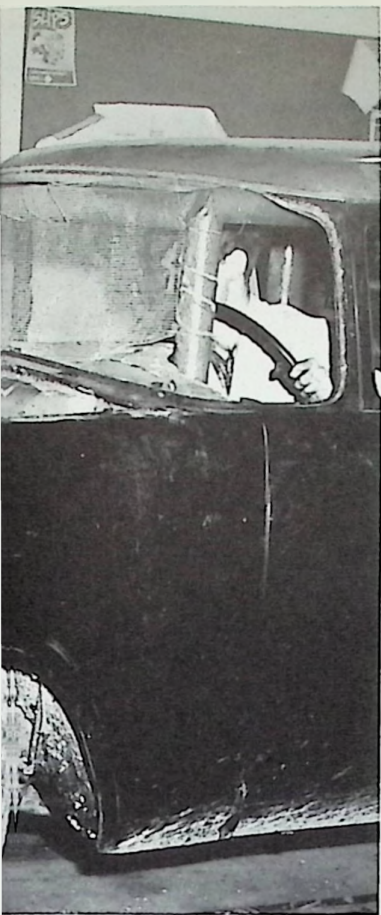

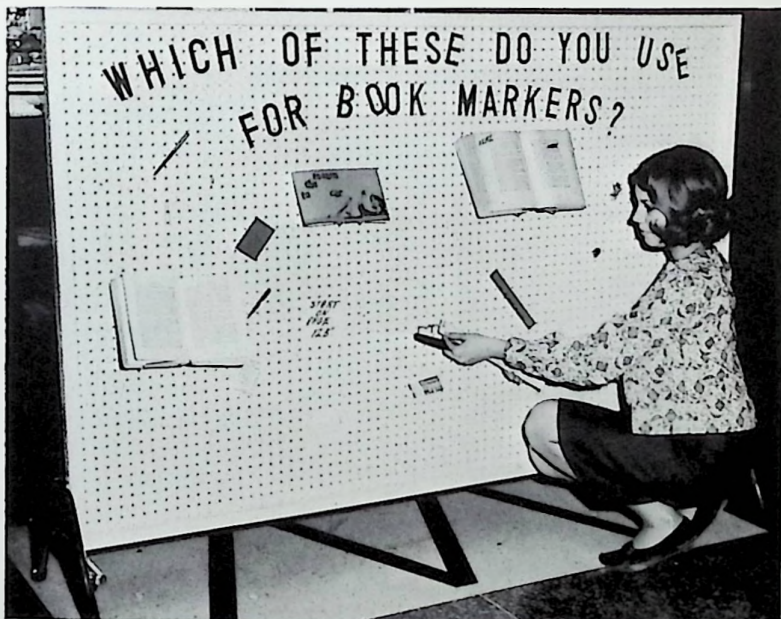
Since organization is another important factor in libraries, it is a duty of the student librarians to place the books in their proper order.

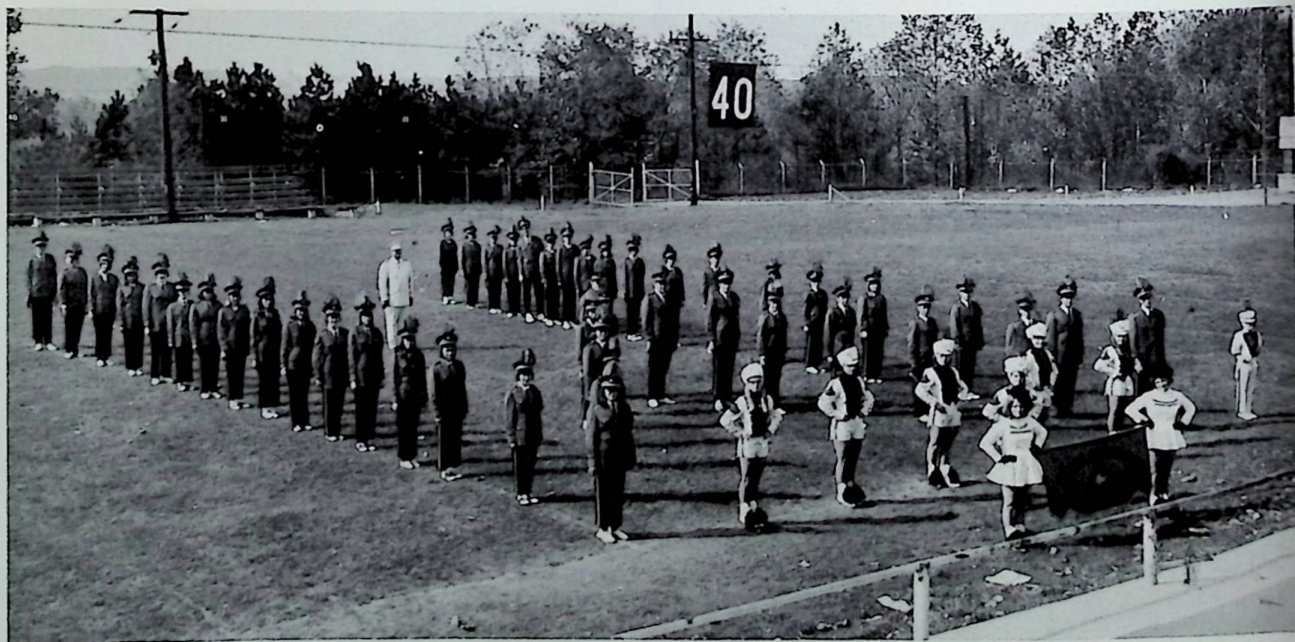

The realization of graduation came to them as they ordered announcements and were fitted for caps and gowns. This alerted them to the necessity of completing their future plans.

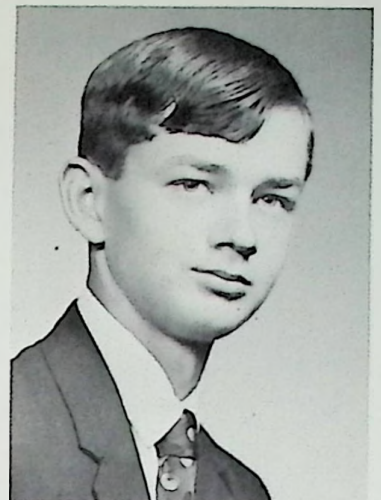

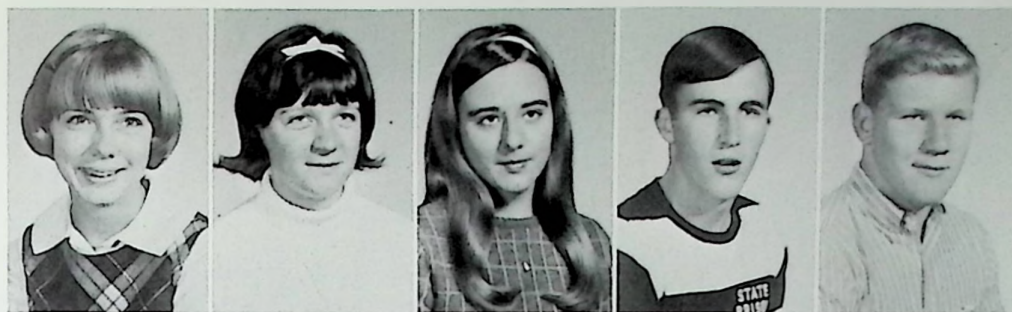

Besides undertaking these achievements, the Student Council was continually kept busy organizing chapel services and special assemblies.



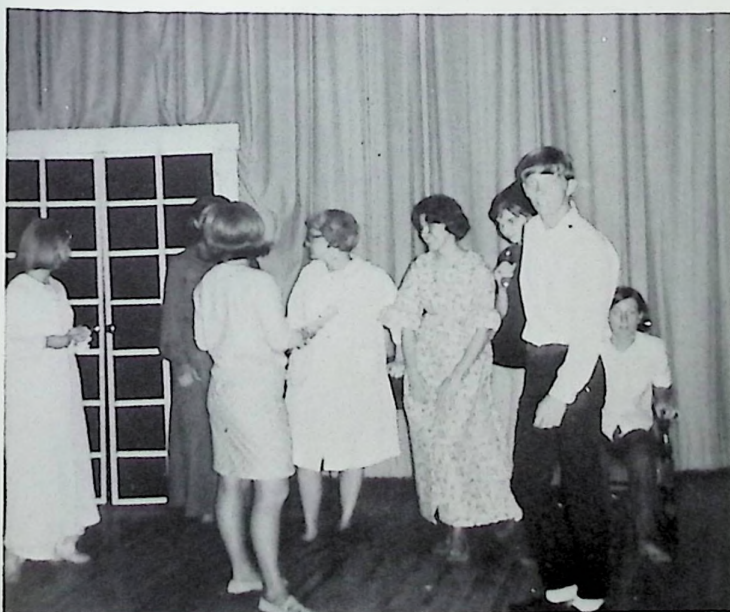

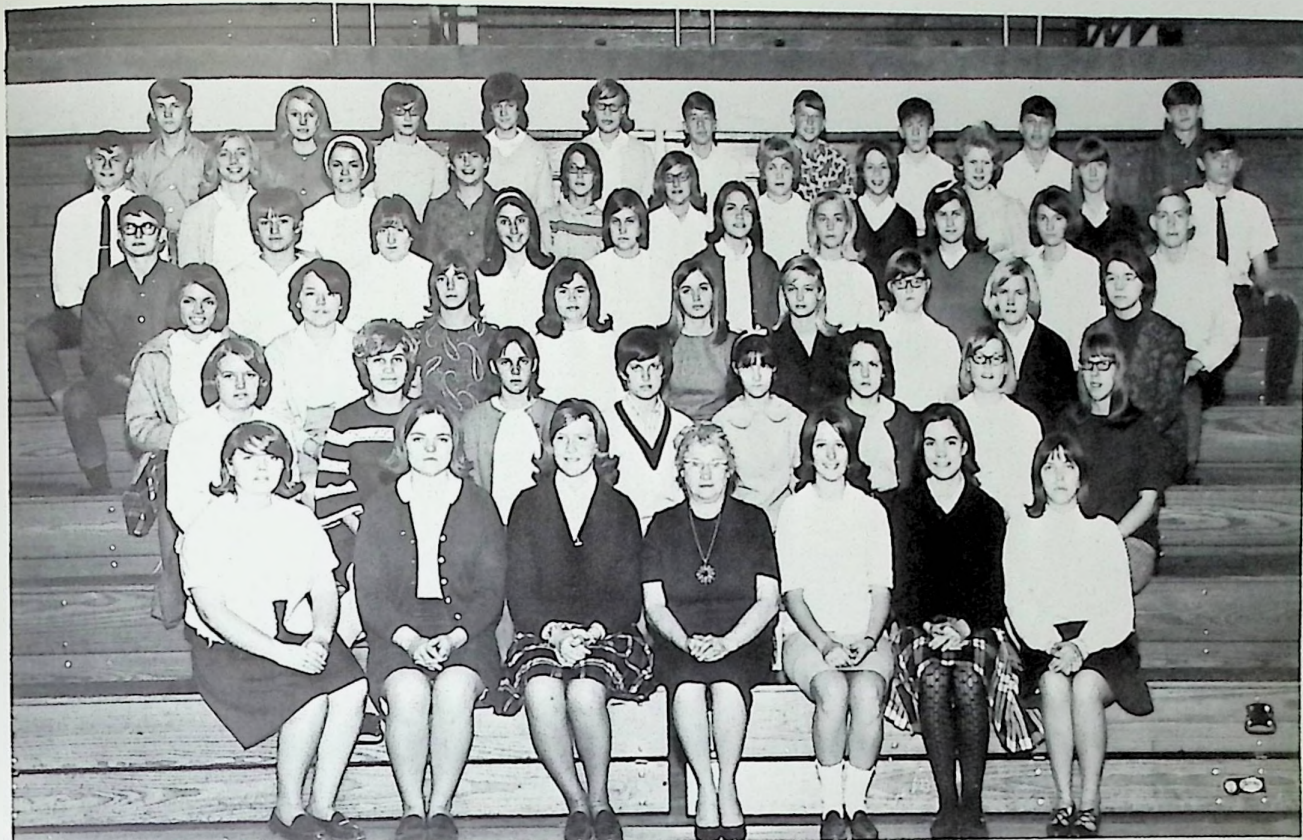

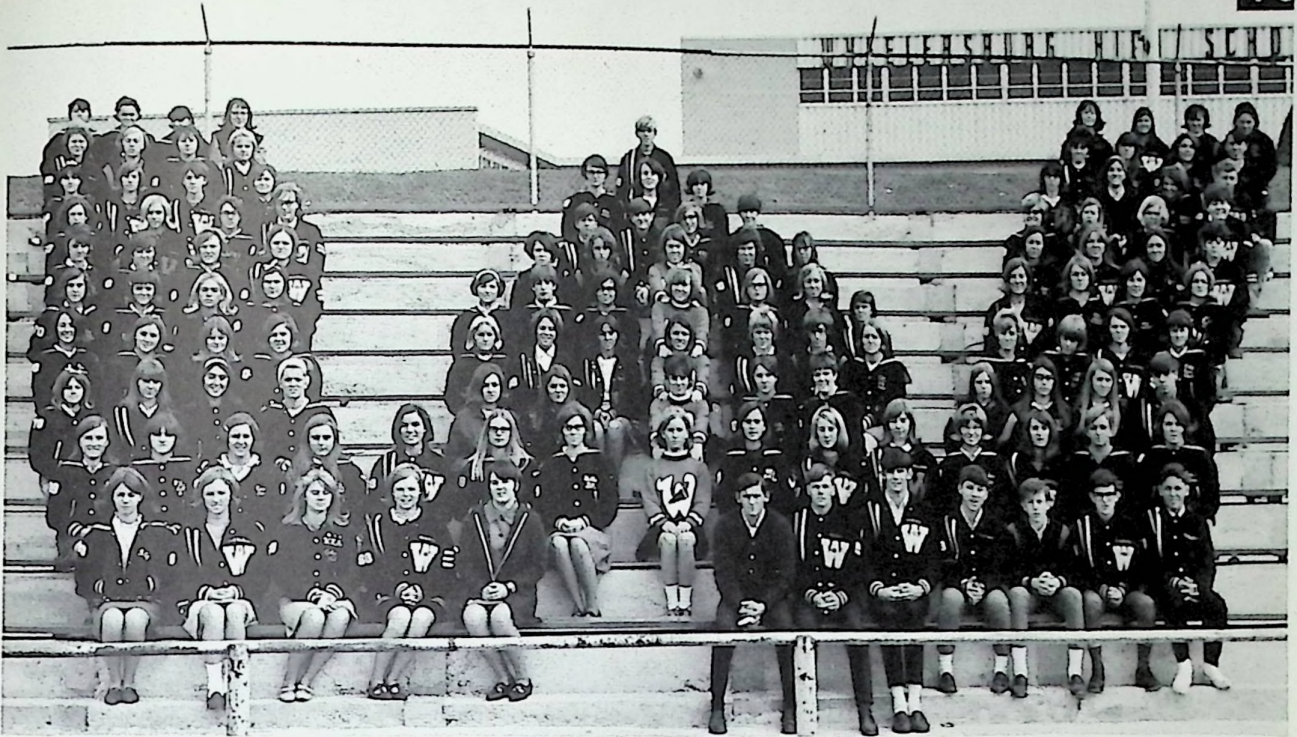

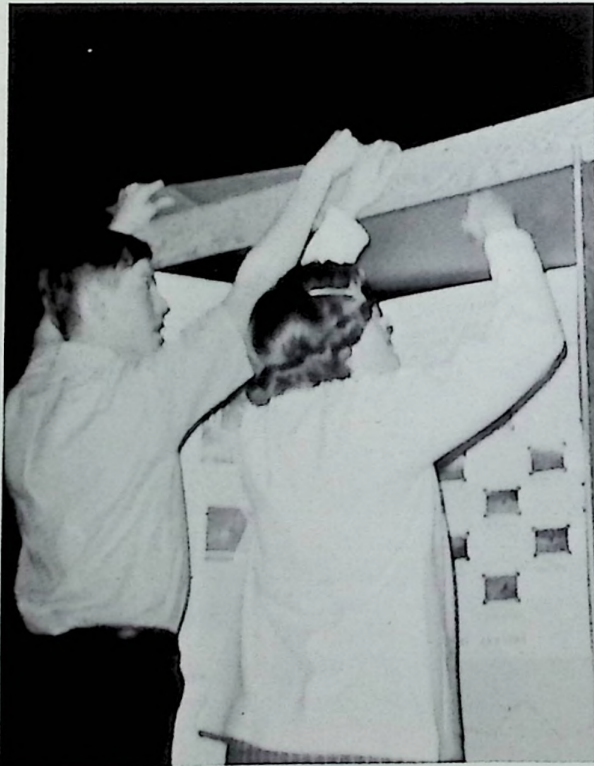

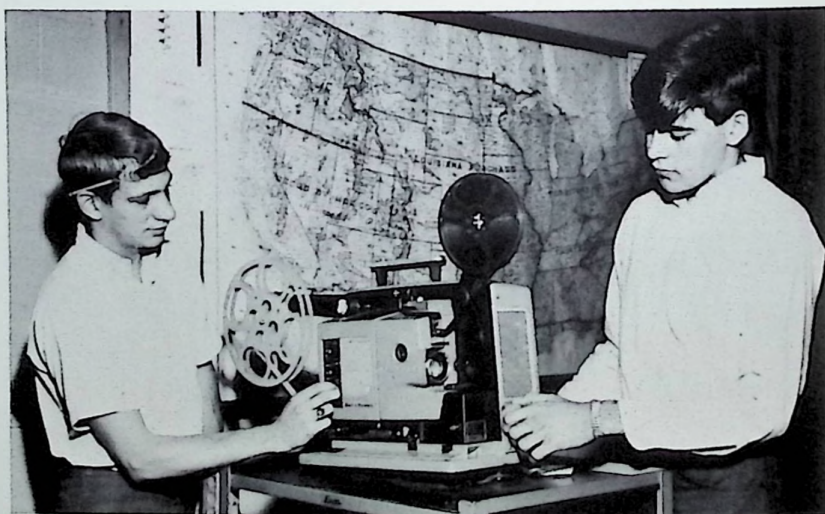

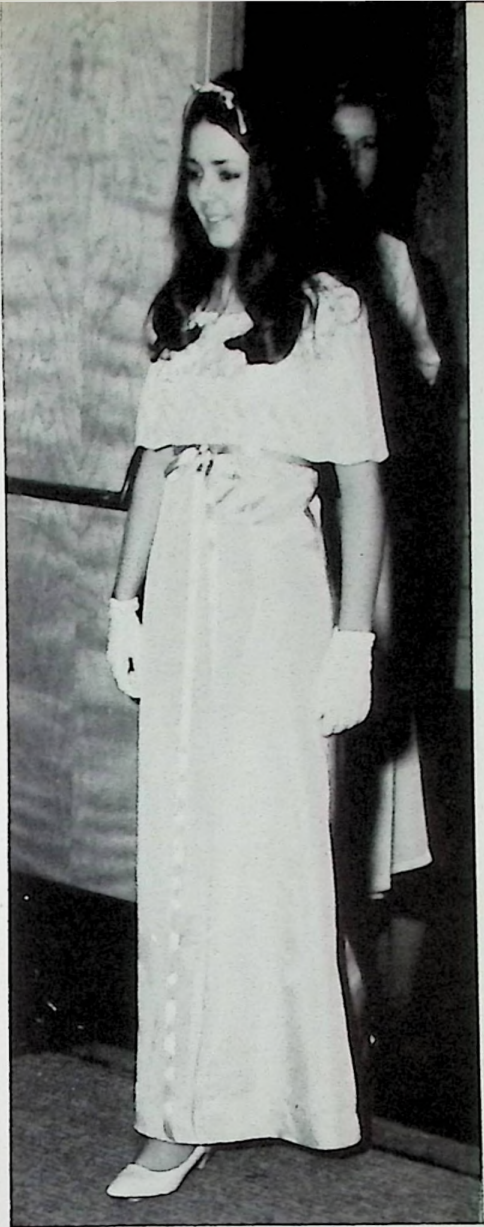
