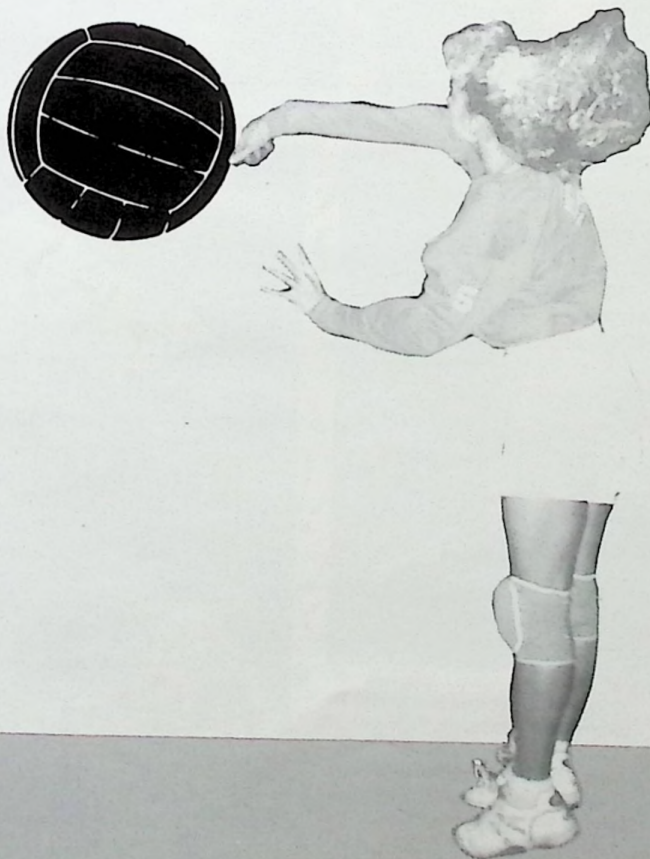

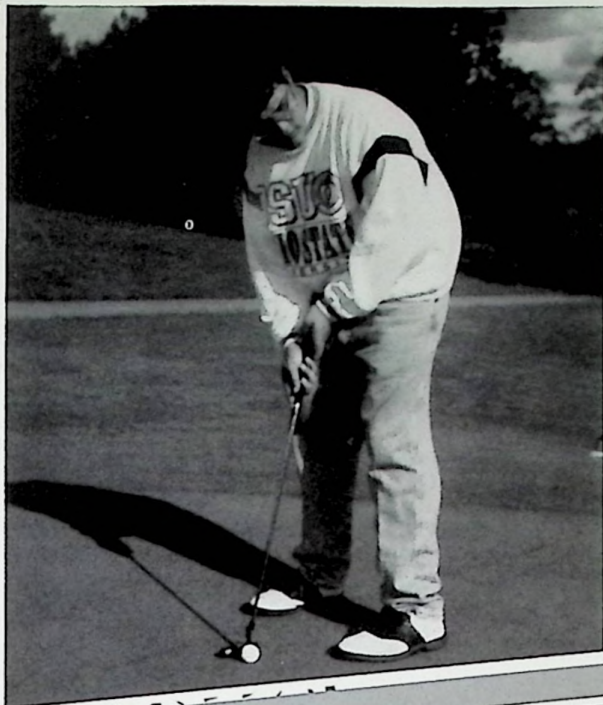

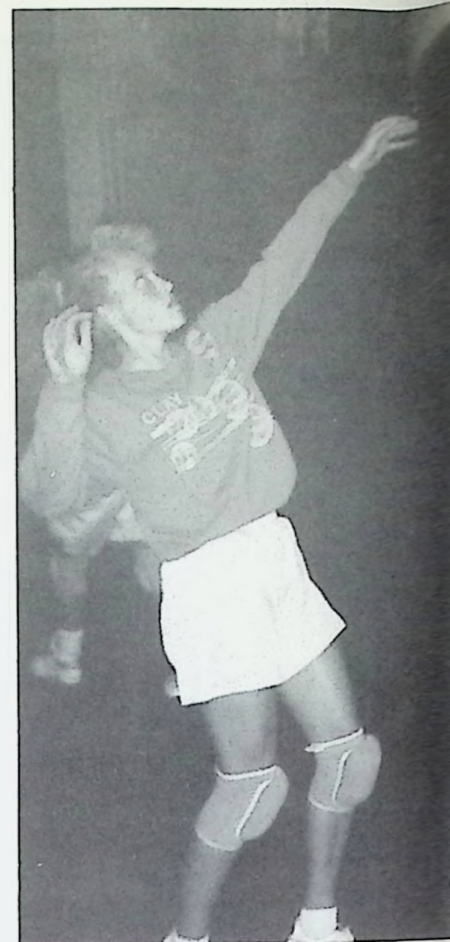
The Girls Prepare For A Winning Season.

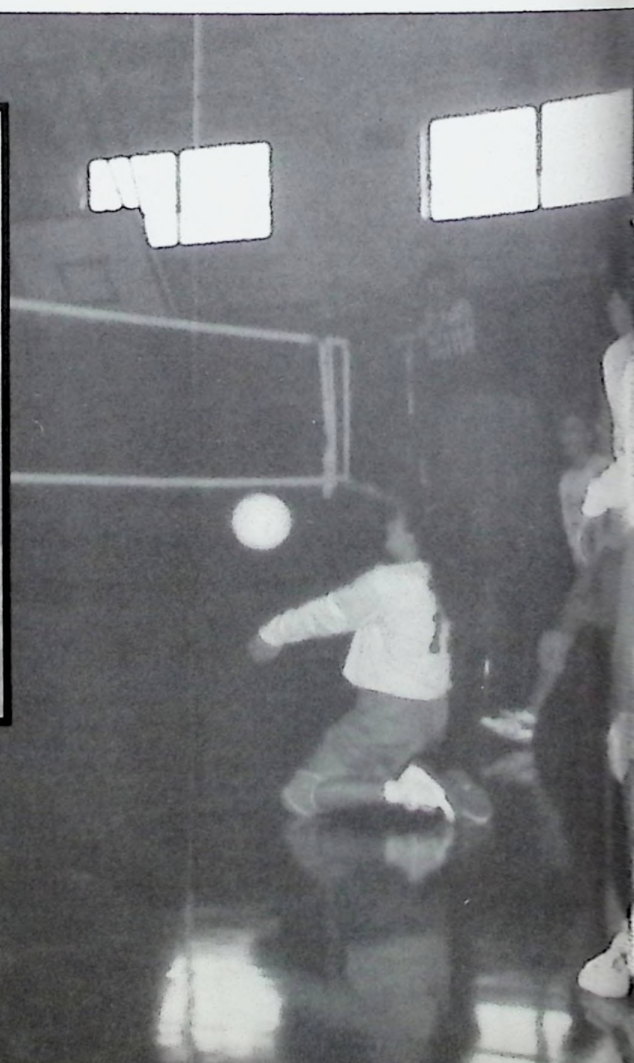
One odd thing that never failed was the coincidental wins between the varsity and junior varsity. Once the J.V. won a game, the pace was set for the varsity panthers to win as well.

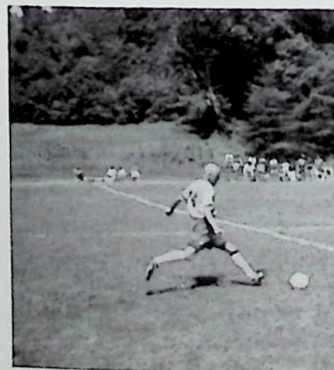
Inexperience Proved To Be A Problem.

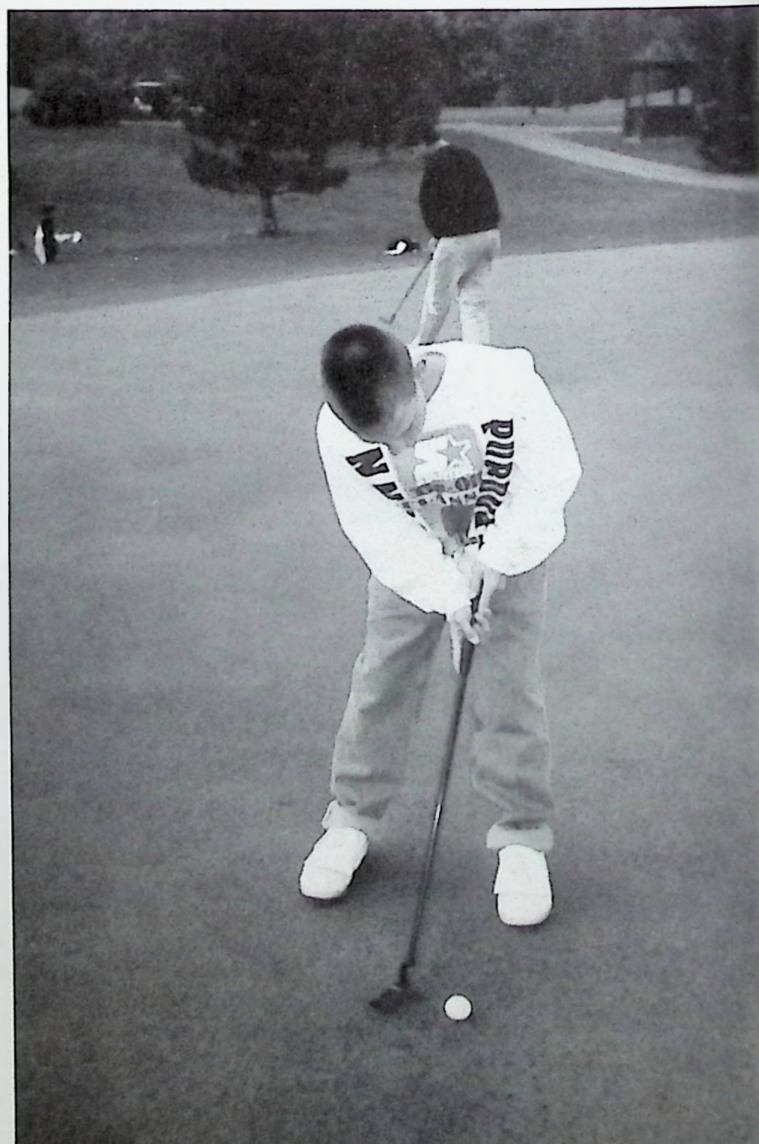

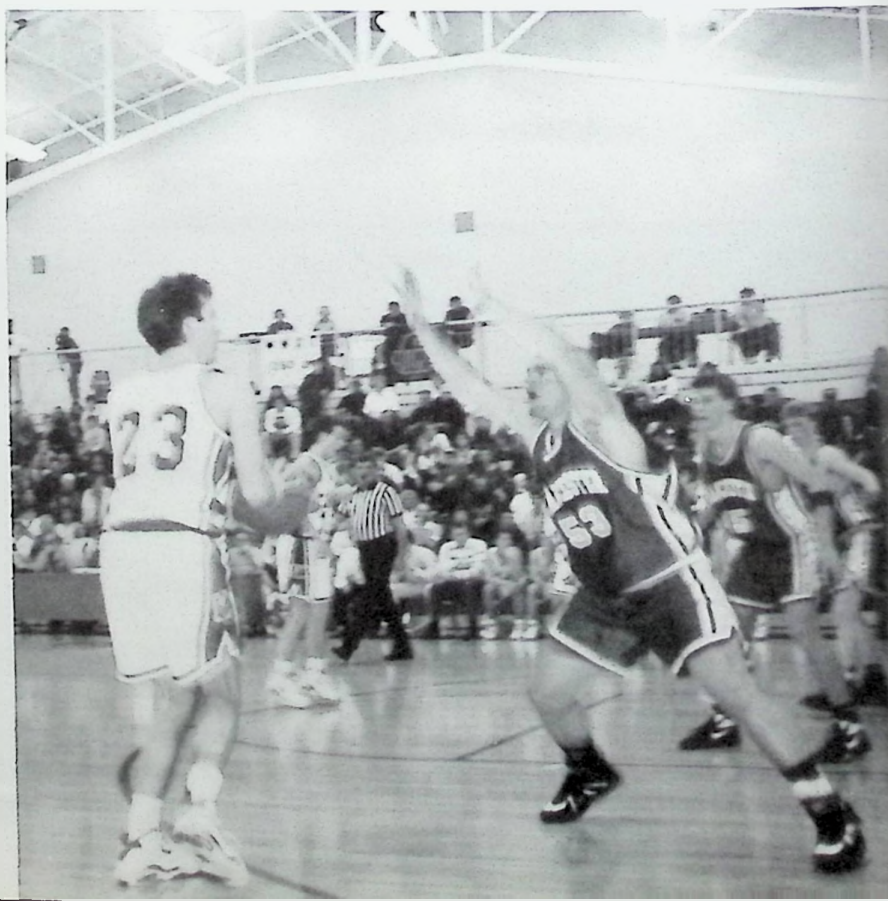

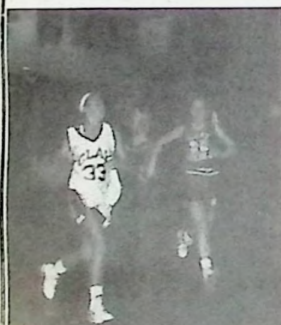
Major Improvements Are Made.

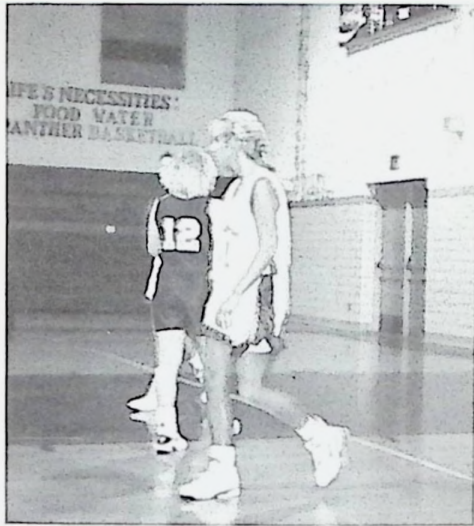

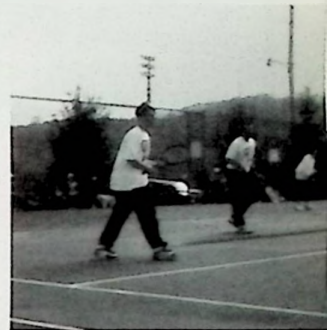

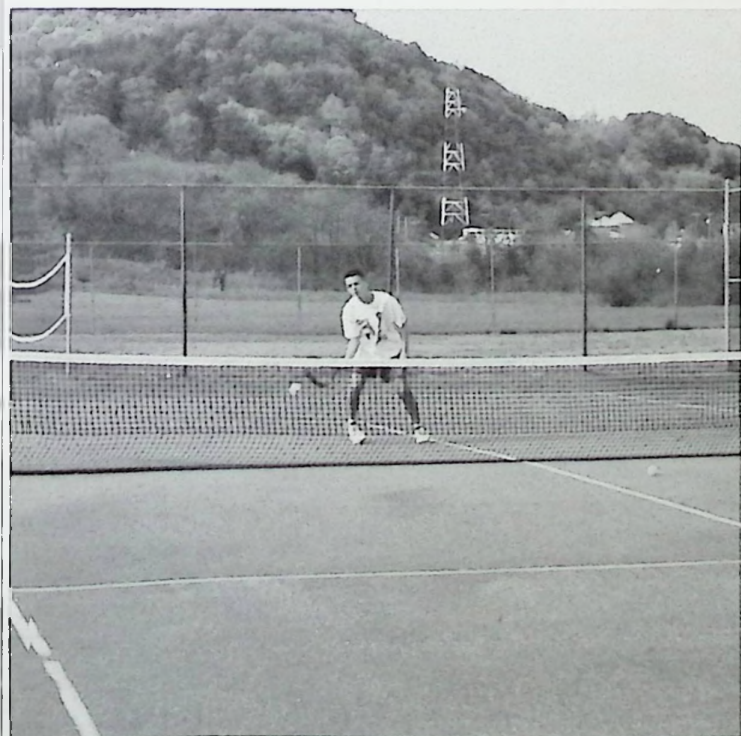
New Players

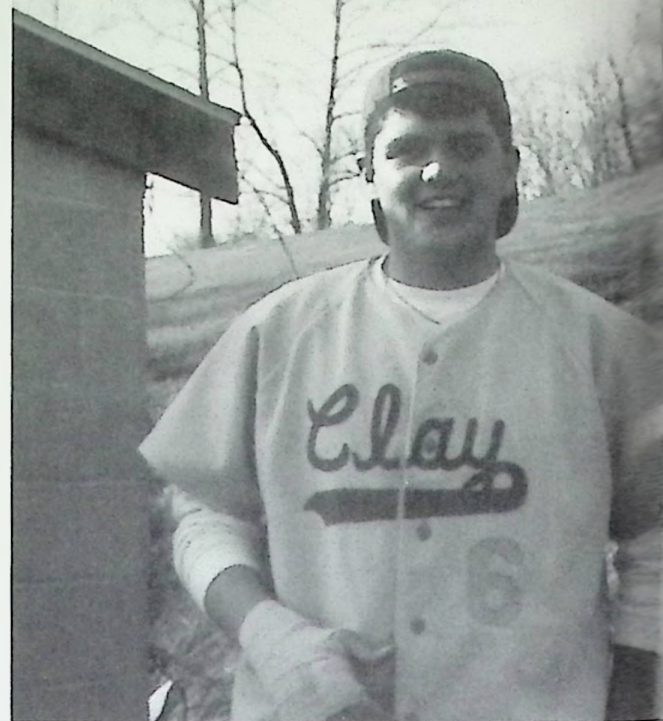


Baseball Team Suffers Through Tough Season. Just A Swingin'

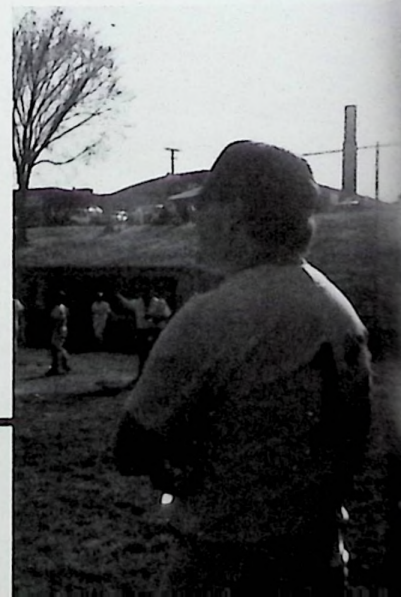
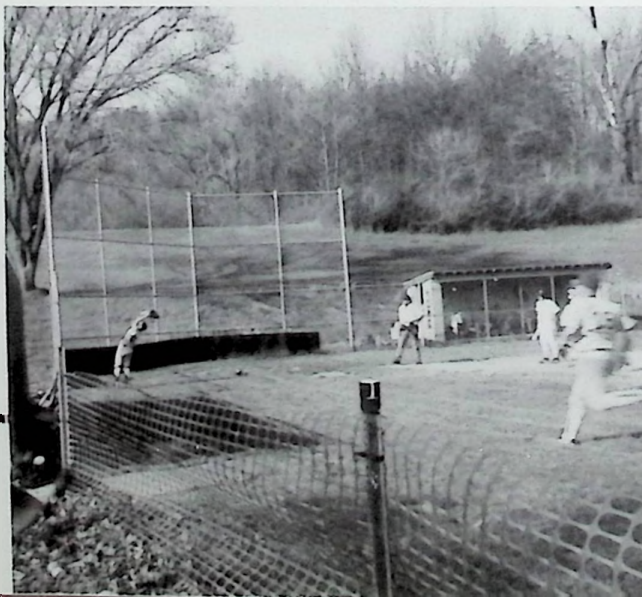


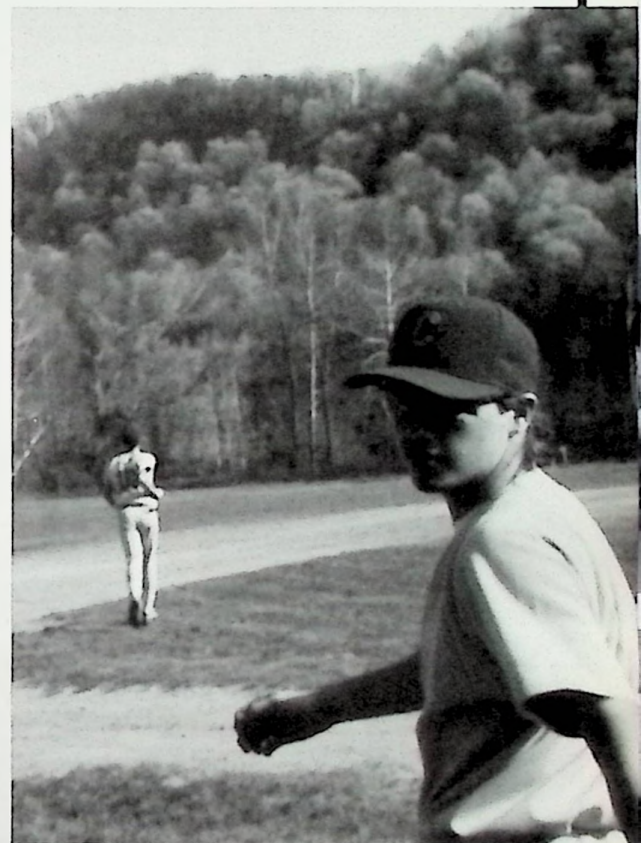

Softball Team Competes At Regionals.

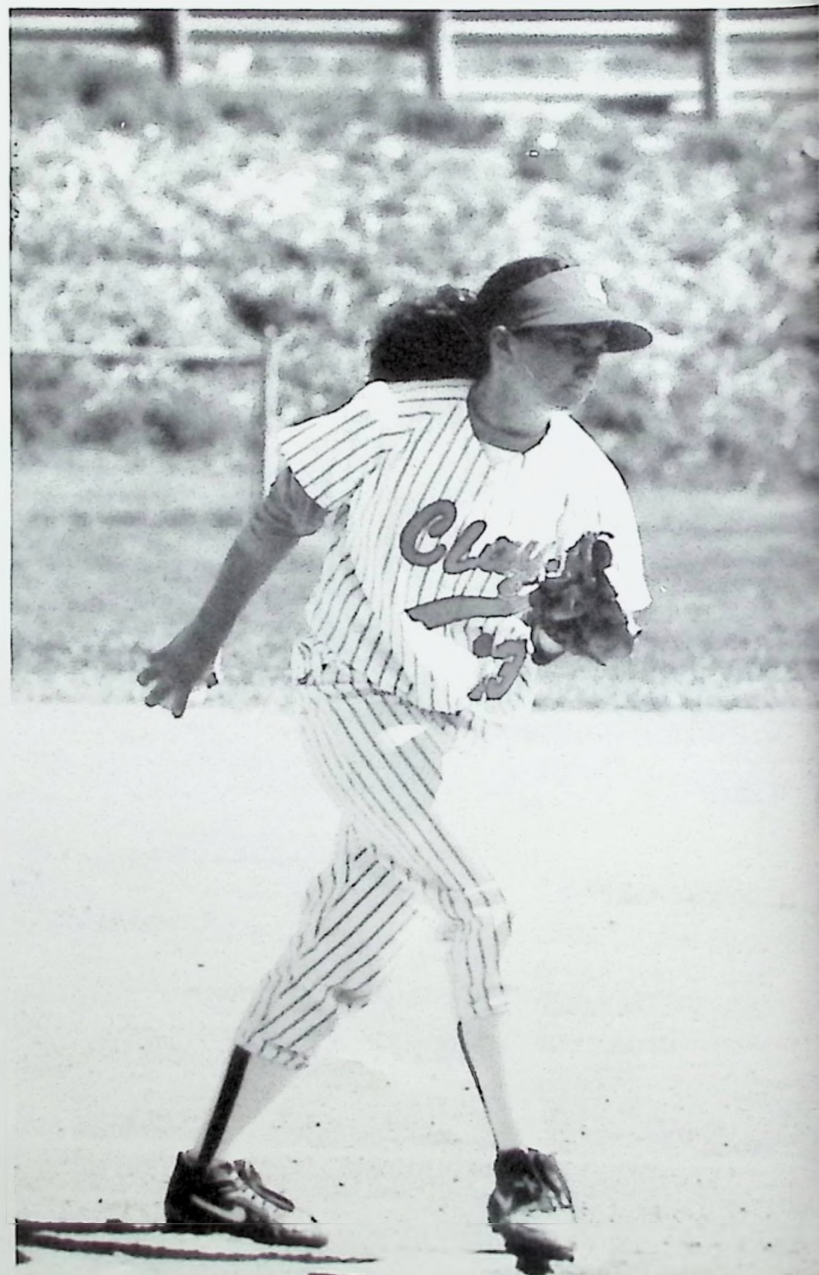

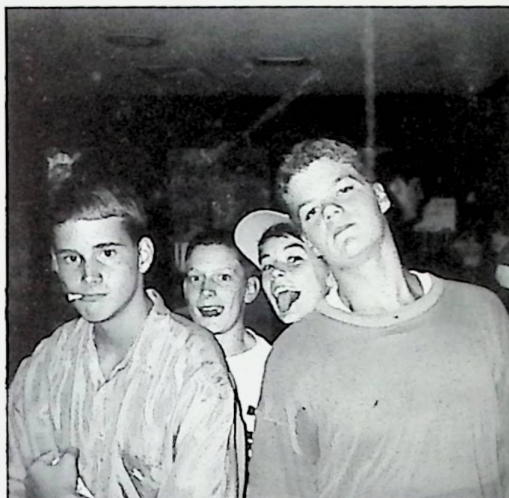

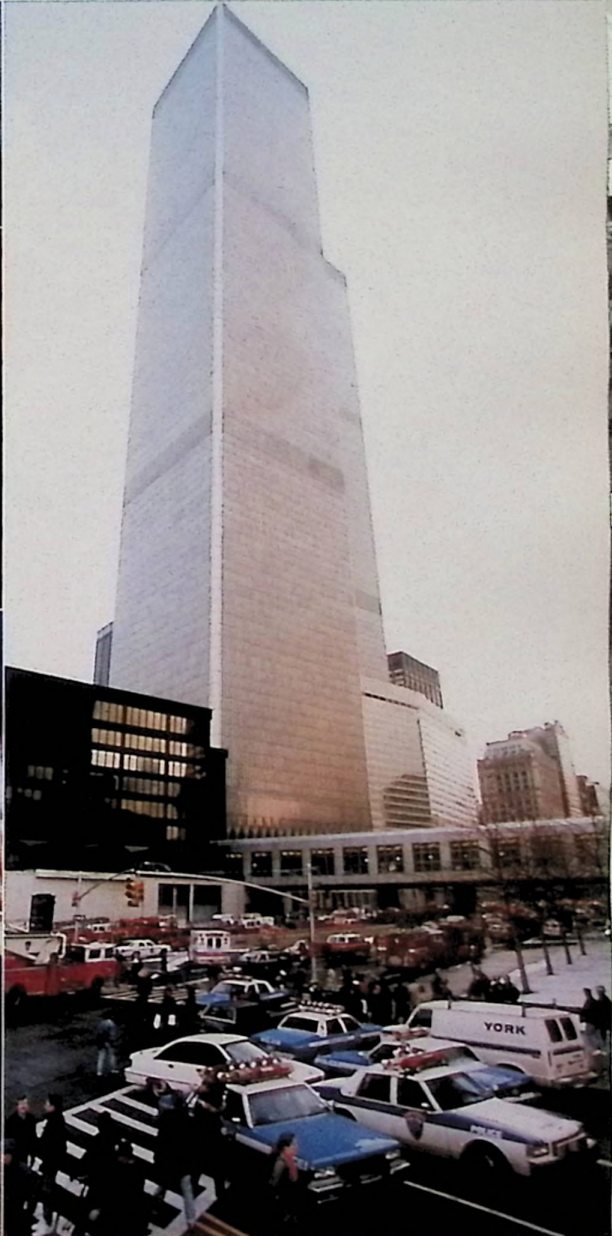

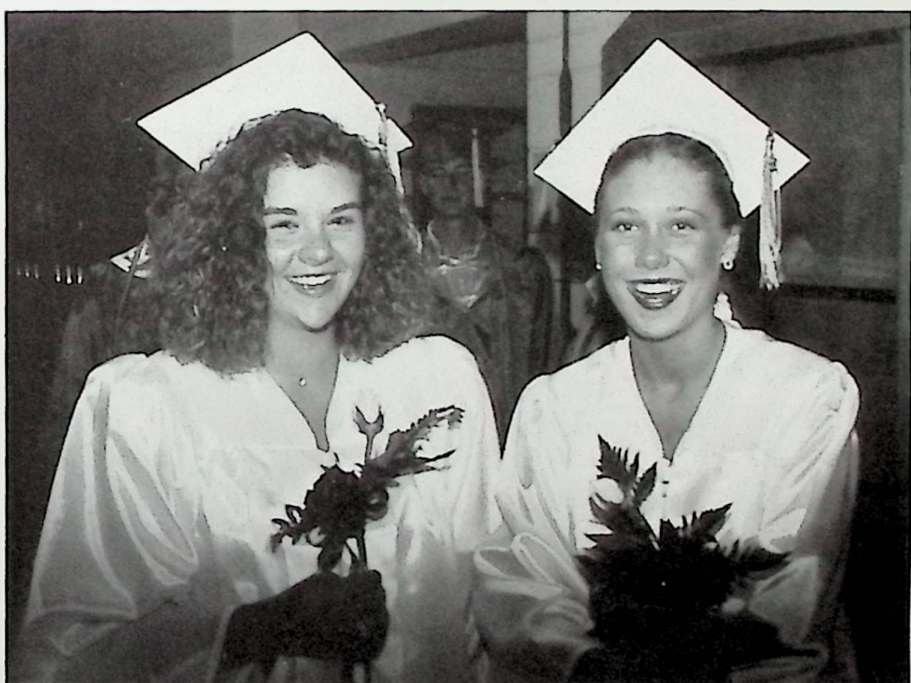
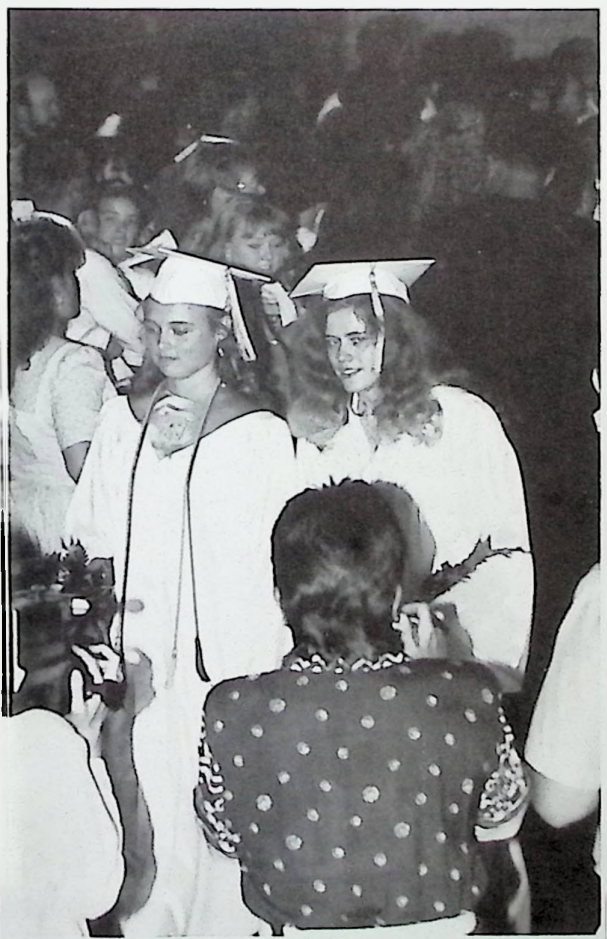
Graduation Day Brings Responsibility. Independence Day

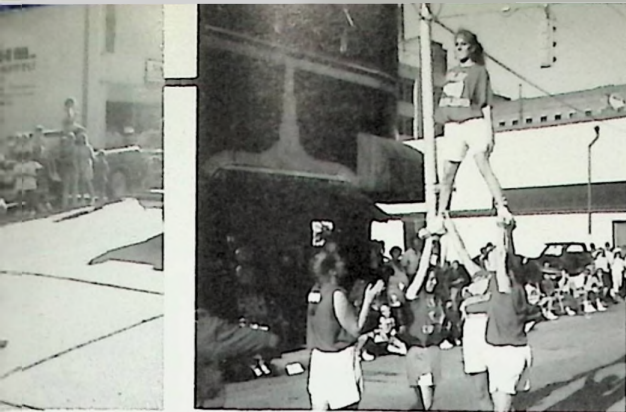
"Hey All You Panther Fans . . ."

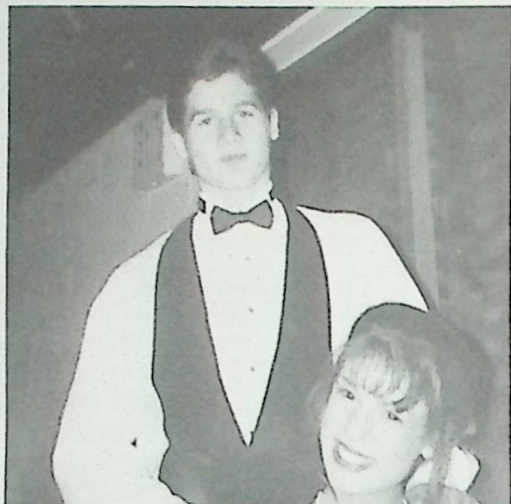
Words do mean everything!

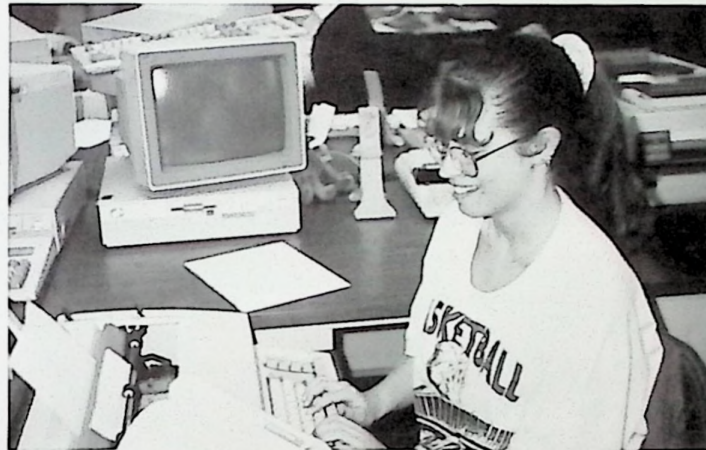

Cancer! What is cancer exactly? Well, in the simplest definition it is a cell that will not stop dividing. There are numerous types of cancer that afflict males and females of all age groups.

Josh Skeans is a survivor of a type of cancer that is prevalent in young, male adults. This cancer is known as Hodgkin's Disease. Hodgkin's Disease is a neoplastic disease that has characteristics of painless, progressive, enlargement of lymph nodes, spleen, and other lymphatic tissue; all of which help fight infection. No cause has been directly linked to this disease, inspiring many physicians to believe it to be viral. This cancer could be relentless and ultimately fatal. Yet due to recent advances in therapy and medical technology, Hodgkin's Disease is potentially curable (even in advanced stages).

In Josh's case, the symptoms were finally clear to the doctor. His swollen lymph node, night sweats, nose bleeds, and a constant feeling of fatigue, along with his biopsy, all pointed to Hodgkin's Disease. Thousands of thoughts went through Josh's head at once. "Why me? Why anyone?" Josh now knows, however, that it doesn't happen only to others. It could happen to someone you know — or even you.

Treatment for cancer can be a great financial burden. So with the help of insurance, funds, and his parents, Josh received the medical care he needed. Chemotherapy, ABVD, and MOPP were very helpful, but he still went through physical changes. Steroids were used to help him regain his weight that he had lost so drastically. Losing hair is one characteristic which most people associate with cancer. Fortunately for Josh, his hair loss was not so noticeable in his thick hair.

Finding out that you have cancer would be shocking enough, but how would your classmates and friends react? With sixth graders as your peers, many of them not understanding the disease or its effects, new fears entered Josh's mind. Yet, surprisingly, those around him were not hesitant to ask questions. They were kind and curious.

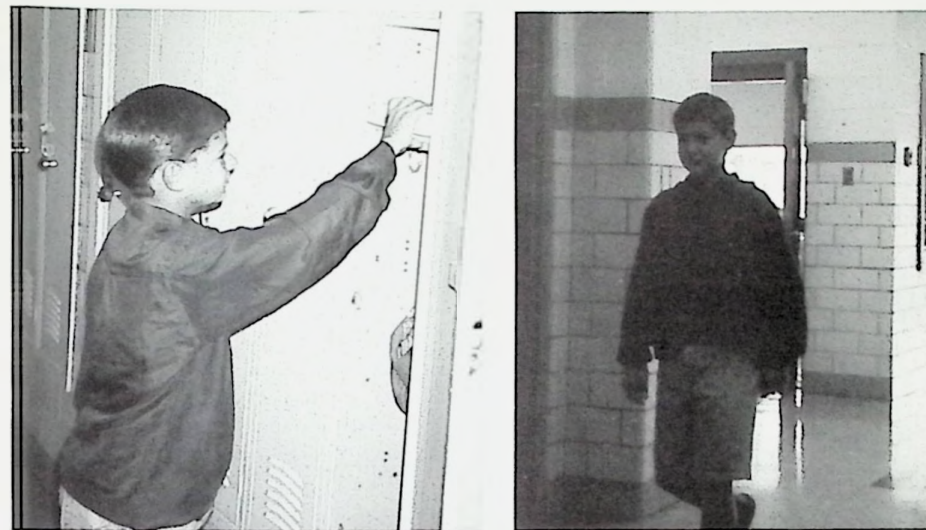
Josh has a great appreciation for all who supported him. Josh would like to send a message to those who were compassionate to his feelings, sent him a prayer, or maybe just thought about him.

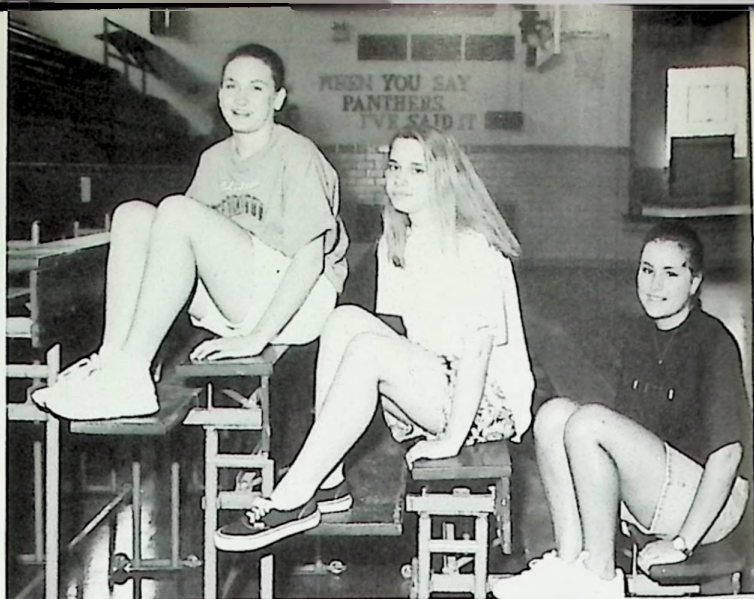

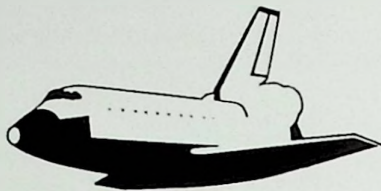

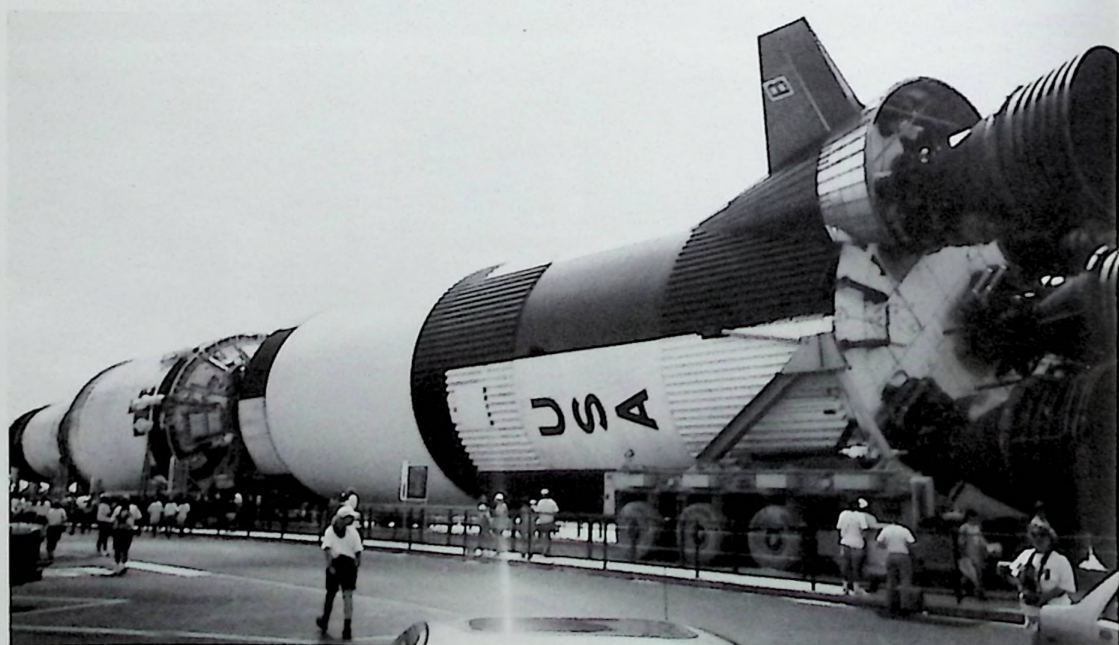
