
C. HAROLD DUDUIT



Fourteen upper classmen met the qualifications to compose this outstanding organization and showed the desired interest to become members.











Physical Checkup

After a period of three months twenty-eight per cent of the students with bad teeth have made their proverbial social visit to their dentist.


This examination is also used for a check in gym classes as no physical examinations are given. Mr. Snook uses this method as a double check on the health and condition of the basketball boys.





3—Senior name cards came in. Every one started a collection immediately. Of course they wouldn't let me have any!


7—Anniversary of Pearl Harbor. I think I'll join the army.
