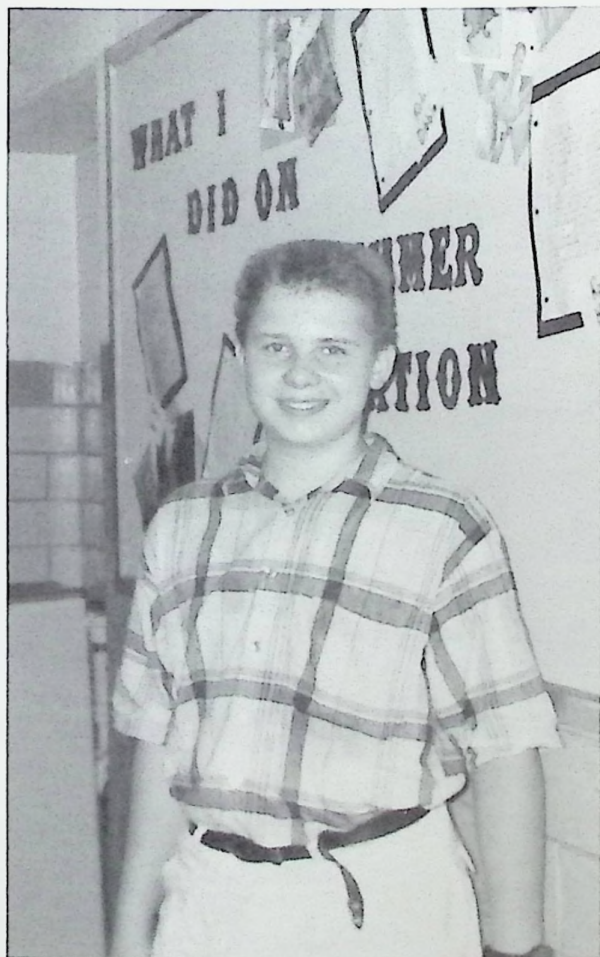

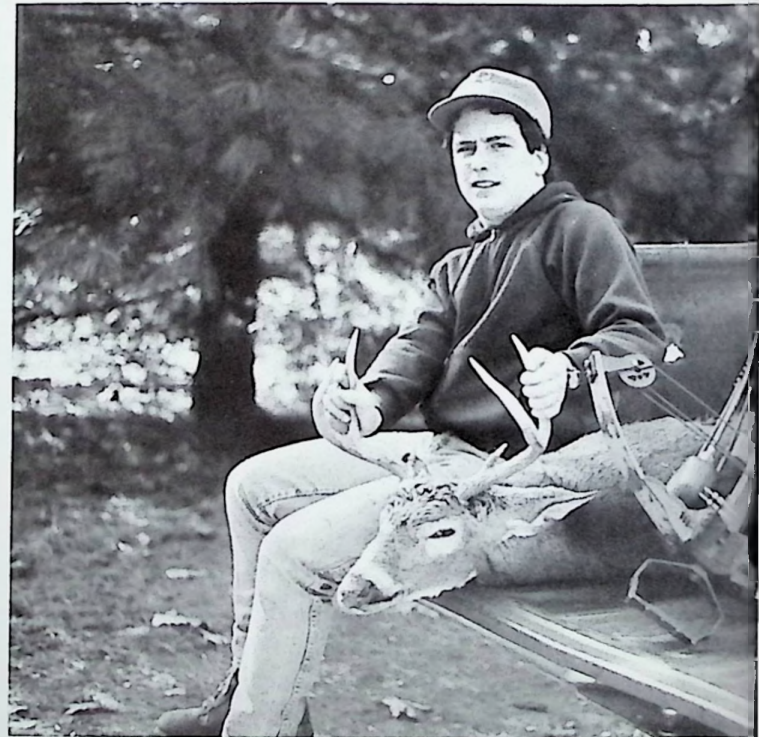

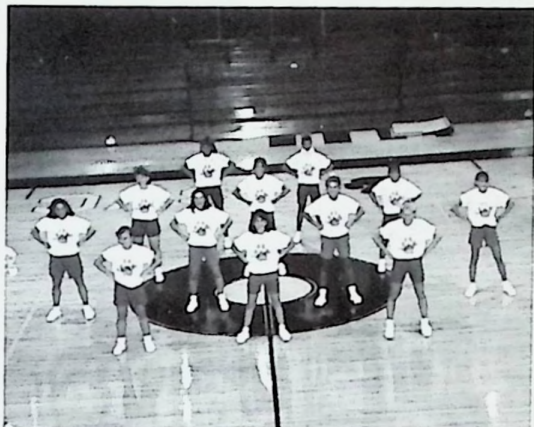

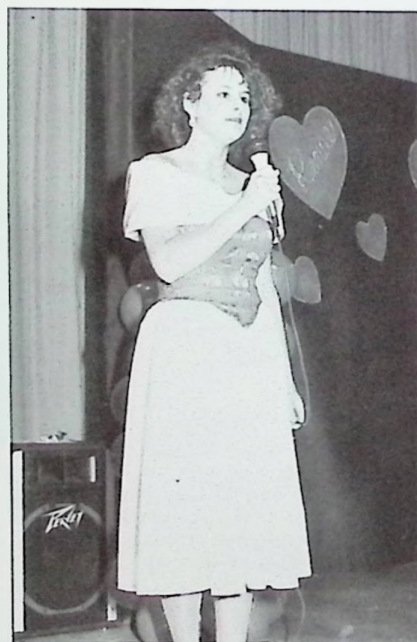

Just remember, we owe all of this story to Mr. Leightenheimer. He is the one who prepared our drivers!



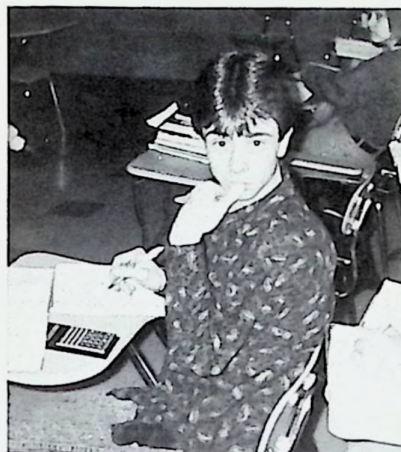

The choices that are available for students include positions in the Guidance Counselor's Office, the high school Principal's Office, the high school Library, and the In-School Suspension Office.

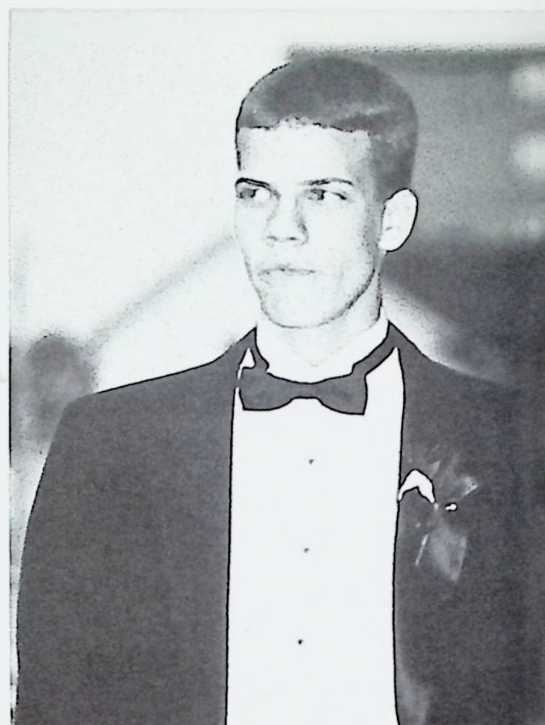
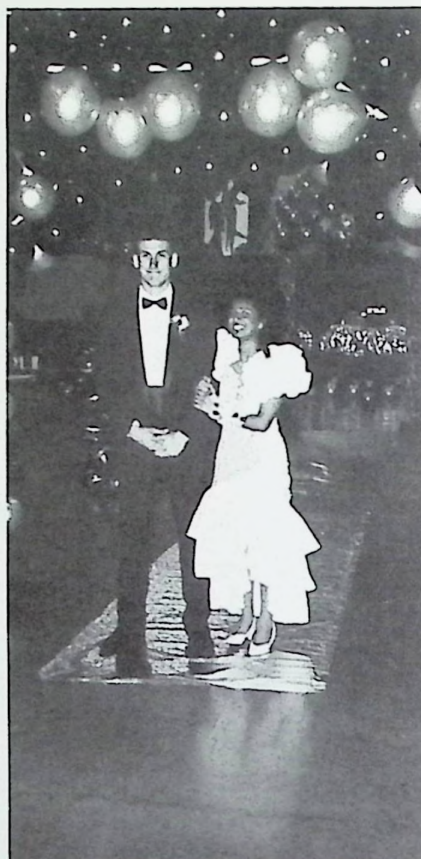

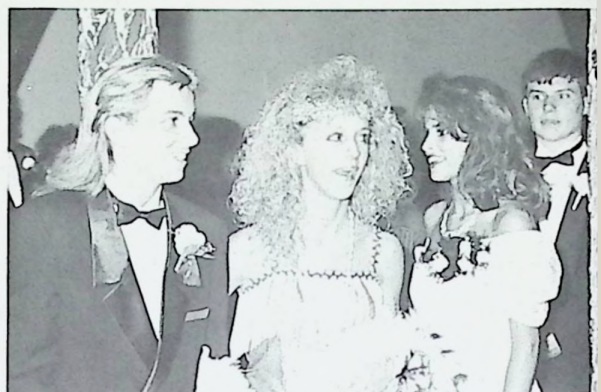

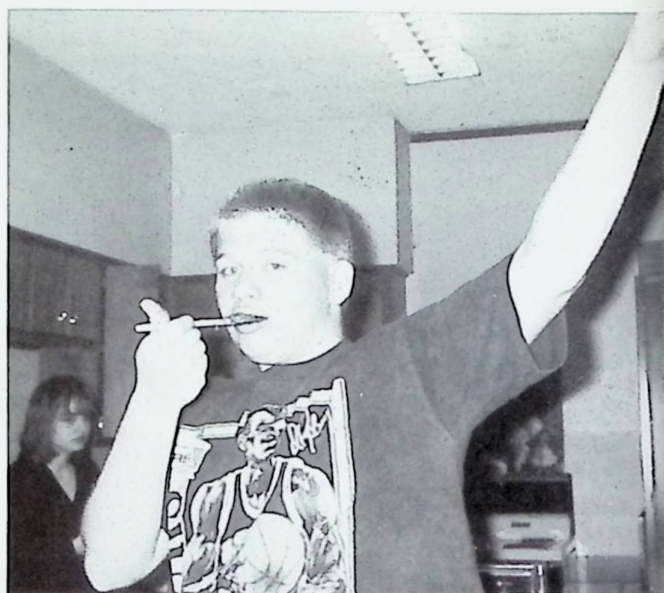
Students Learn A Very Important Art.

leyball, basketball, tennis, and National Honor Society.

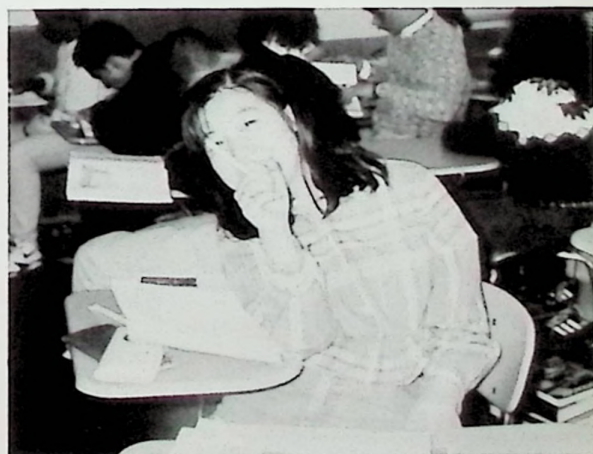
Nana became a close personal friend to all of us. She is now a part of our lives that we will never forget!

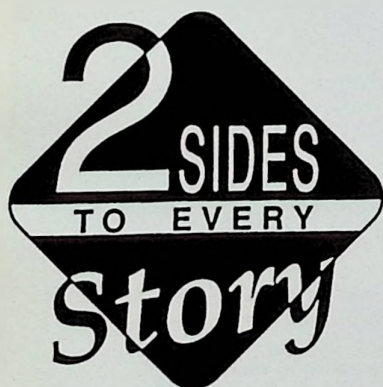

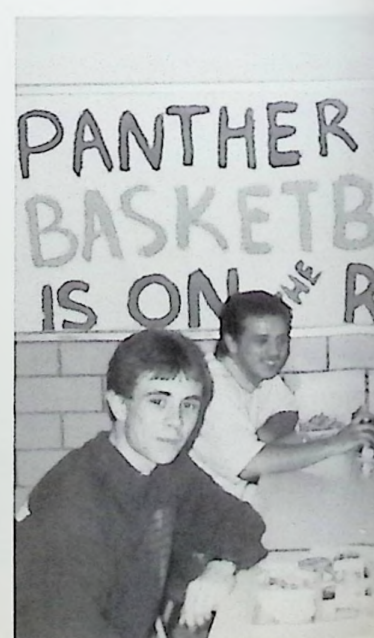
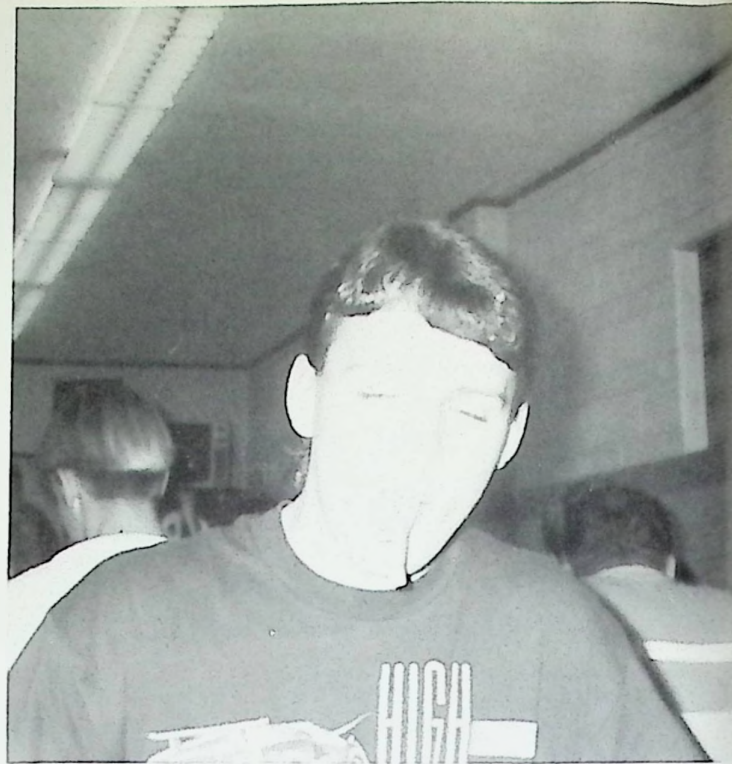
Lunchtime!

This was not a senior class picnic! It was a celebration of friendship built by working, studying, and school!

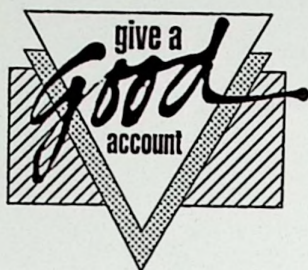


Friendly meeting. Friends gather under a shelter house to discuss their senior year. Plenty of food and stories were brought to ensure that everyone had a great time.

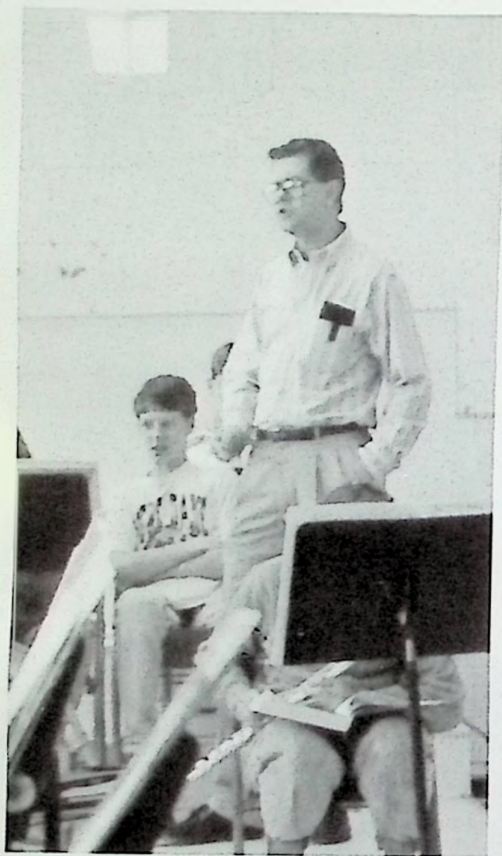

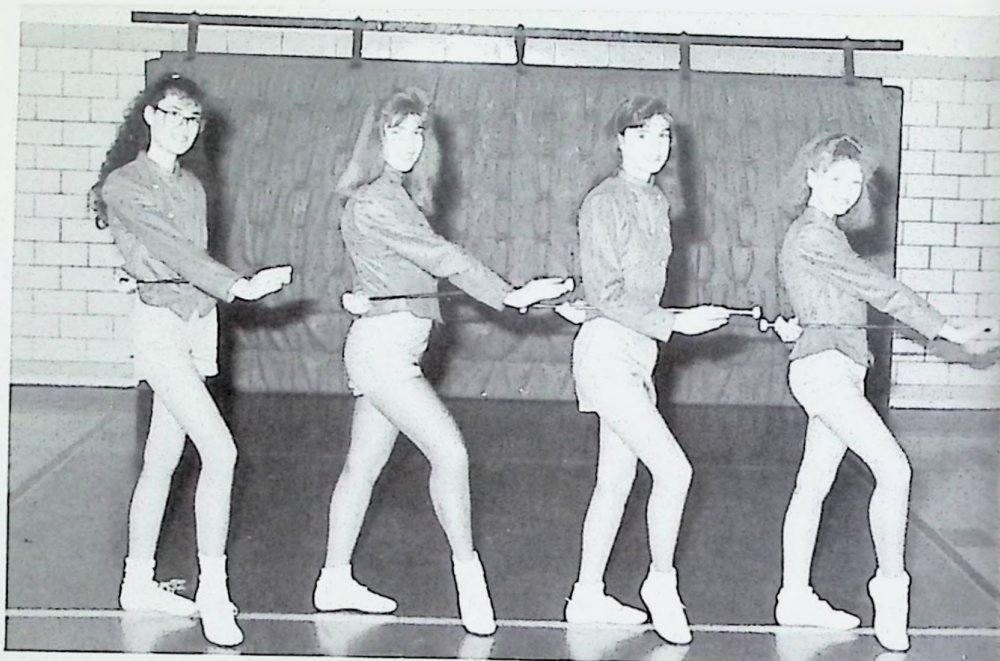
Music played a major part in the lives of American teenagers. At Clay High School, the marching and concert bands are avenues in which students can travel to release their creative outlets.

Senior musicians. Seniors Achamma Mathew, Jenny Sayne, and David Brown enjoy band class together. These three seniors played the saxophone.



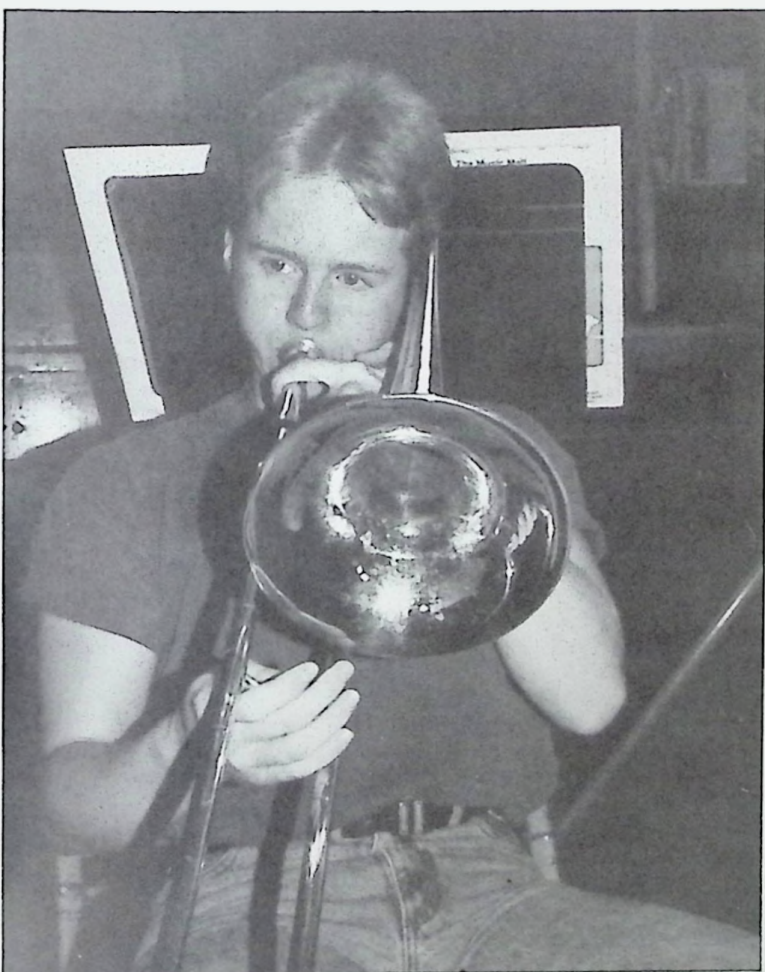

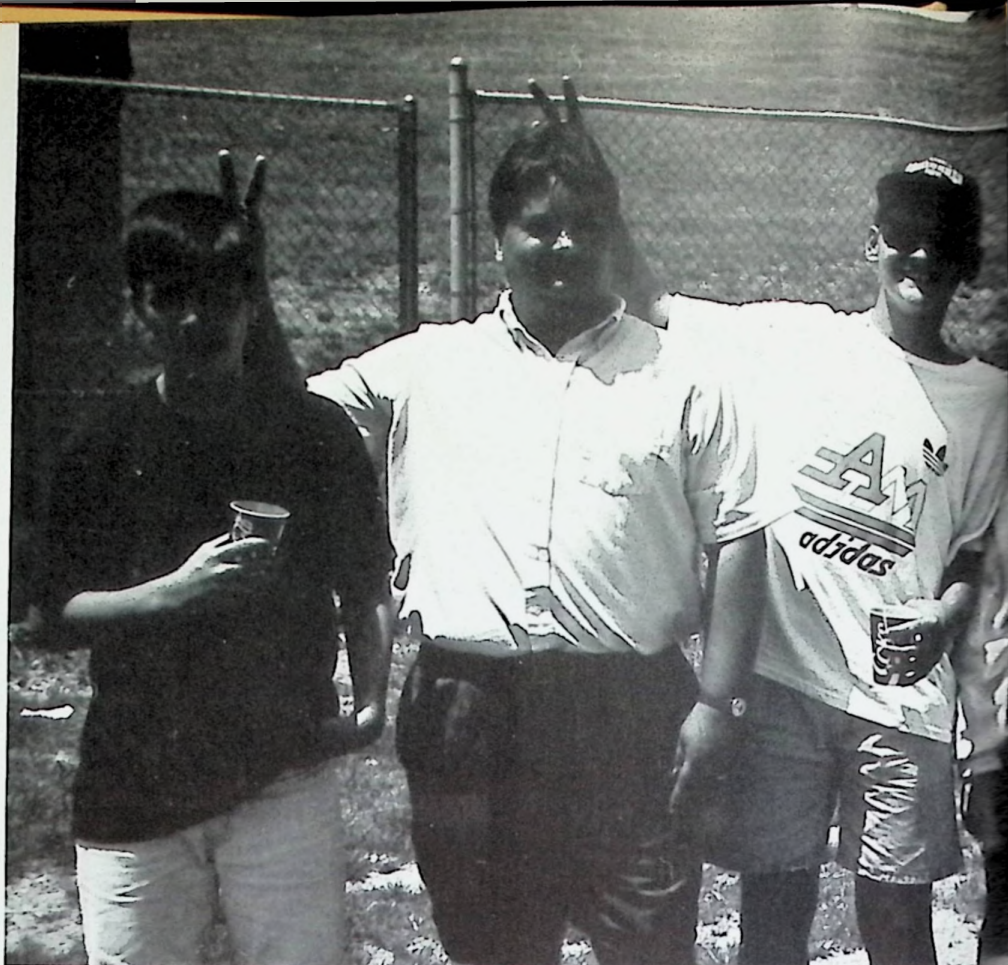
River Days! The largest parade that the C.H.S. Band marches in during the school year is the annual River Days Grand Parade. Junior Elizabeth Risner waves to the camera.

Juniors Claim Unfair Labeling Misinterpreted!

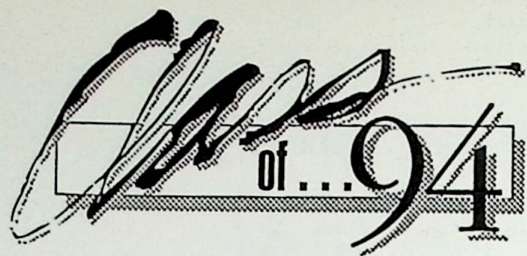

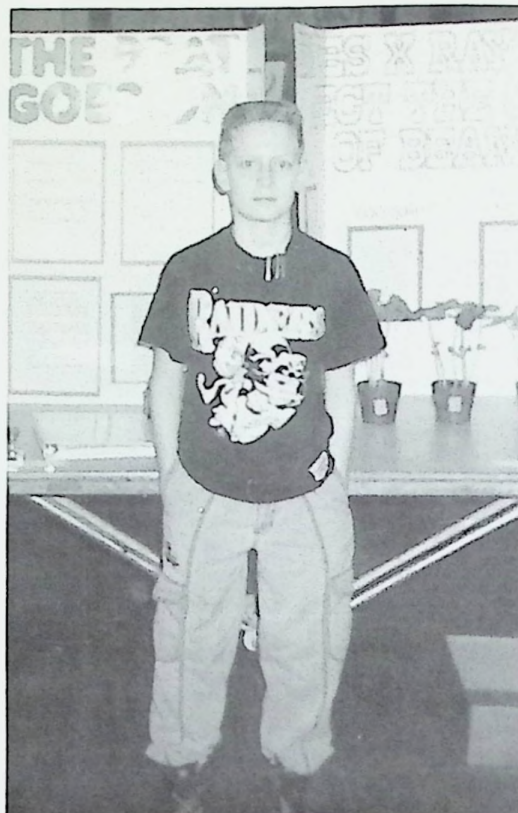

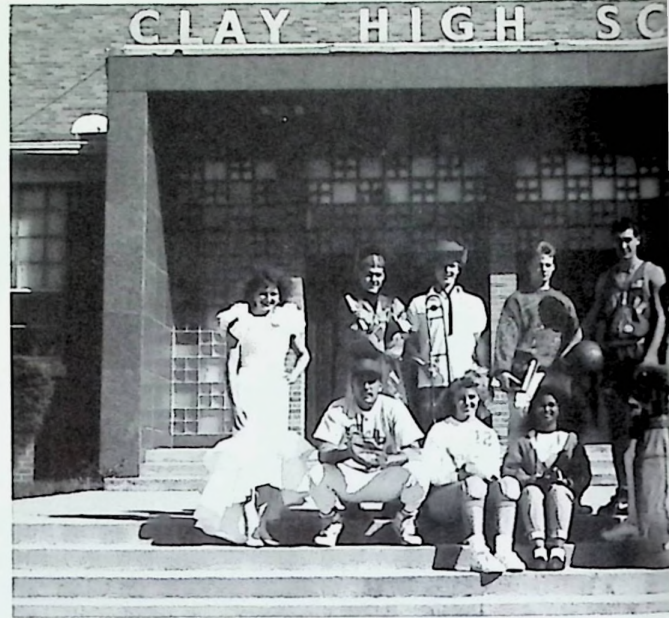

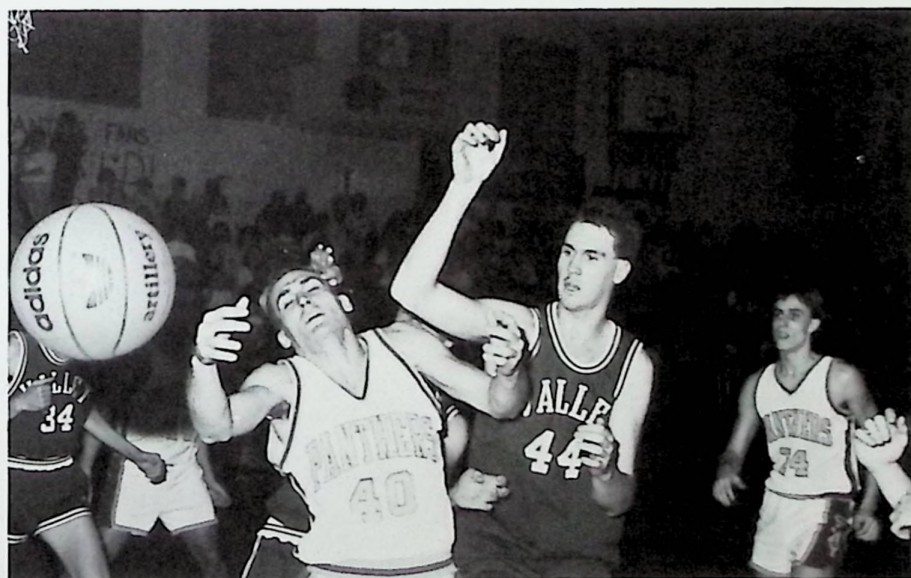

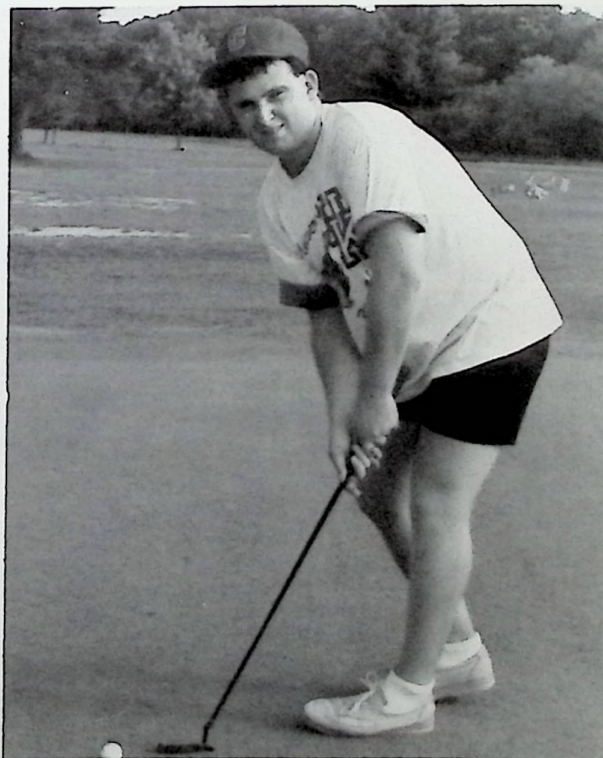
A Birdie Told Me!

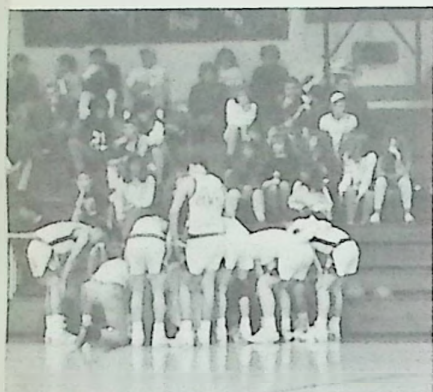

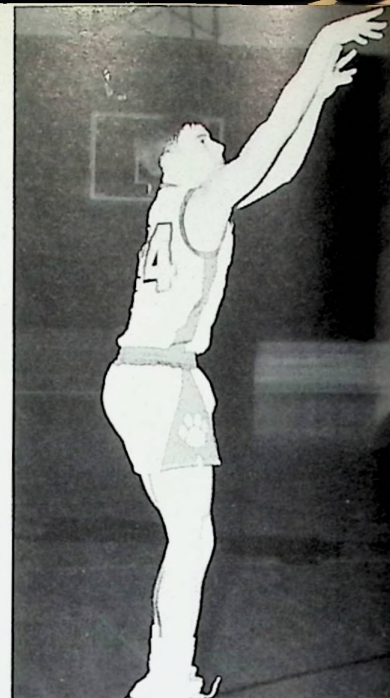

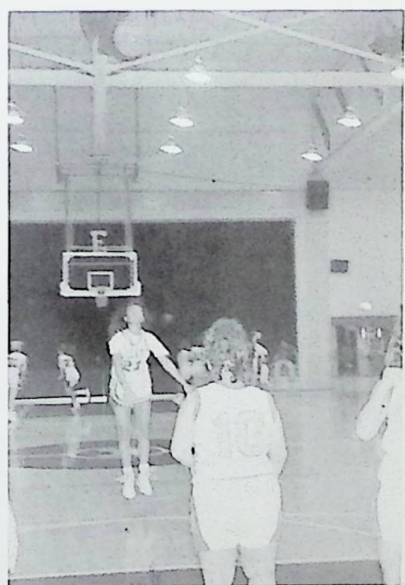
Interest Is High As Girls Come Out For B-Ball!

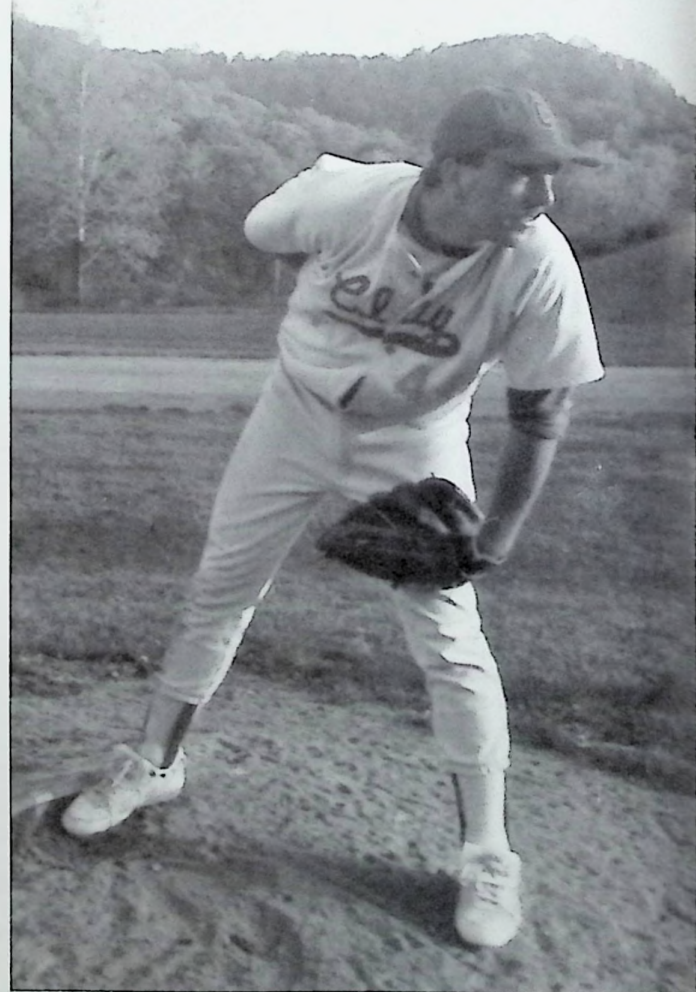

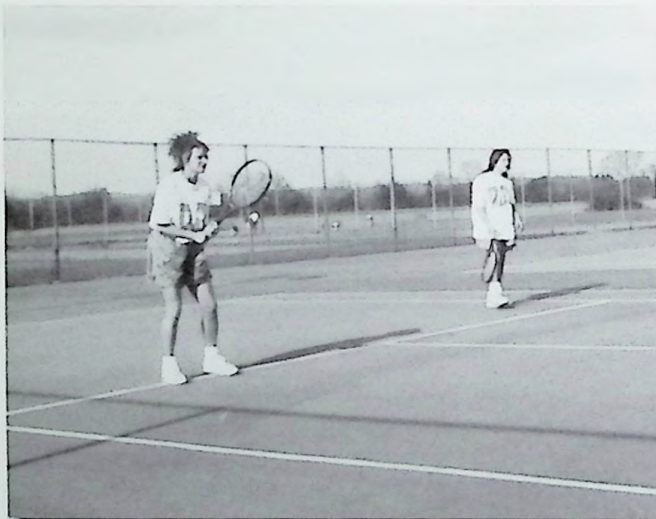

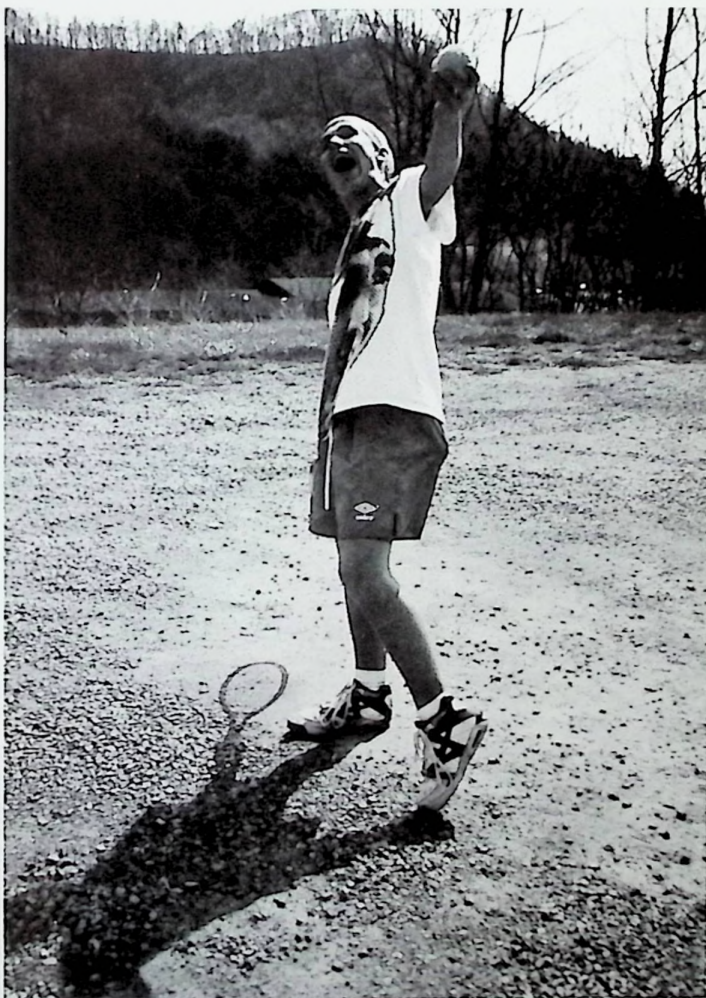

Teachers Seek To Inspire Greatness.

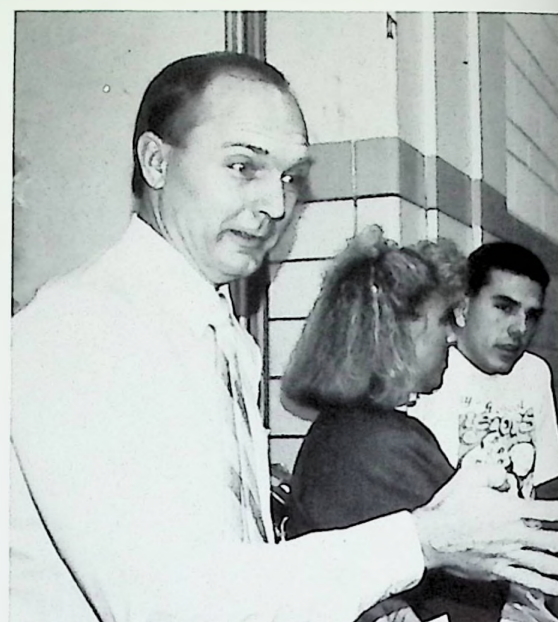
In the first five minutes of a new year in a new class, the teacher makes an impression that leaves a permanent imprint on the minds of his or her new students.
