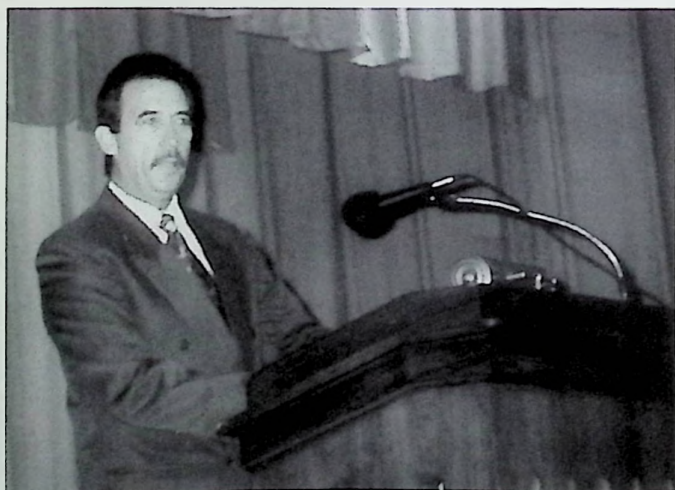

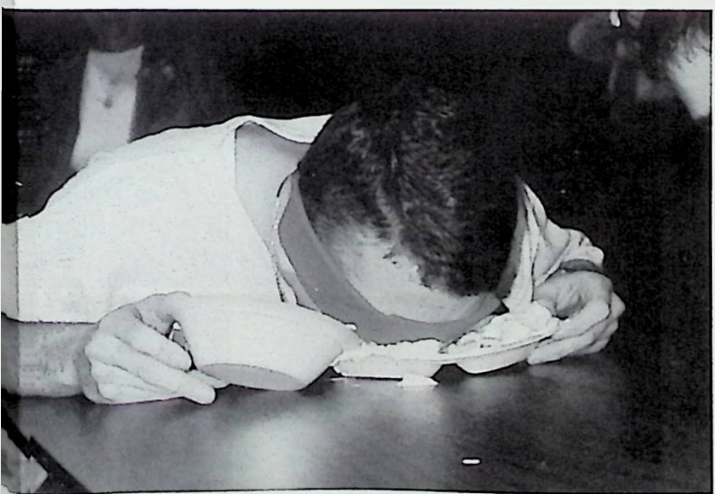

Mrs. Stevens and Mrs. Potter are having a laughing contest. This will be a close one. Mrs. Potter may win on seniority, but it will be close.

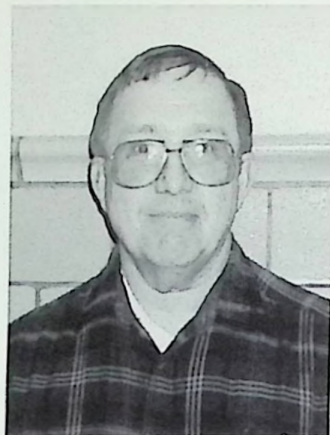

Donna Grimm is the school treasurer. We often saw Donna selling tickets and working concessions during athletic events.



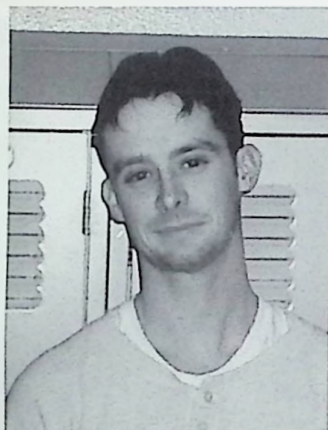
Donny Porter is the custodial supervisor for New Boston Schools. Donny always had a ready smile and bits of wisdom.

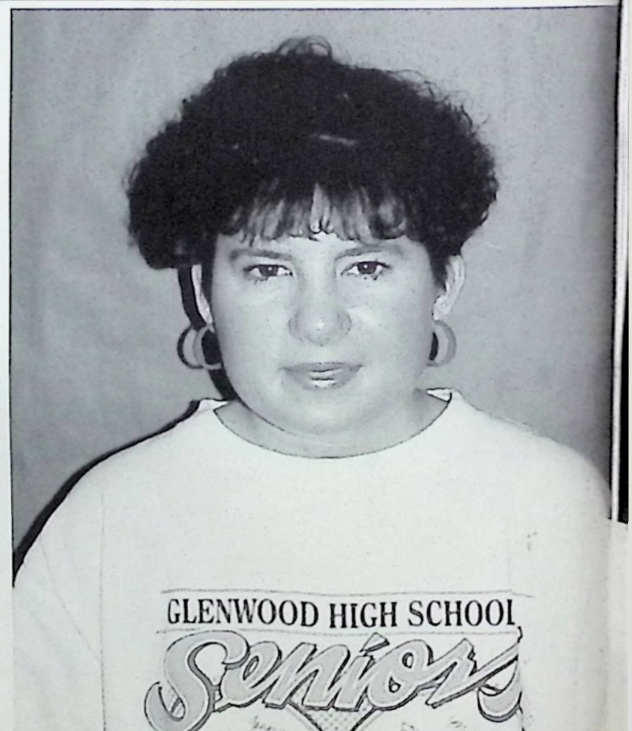

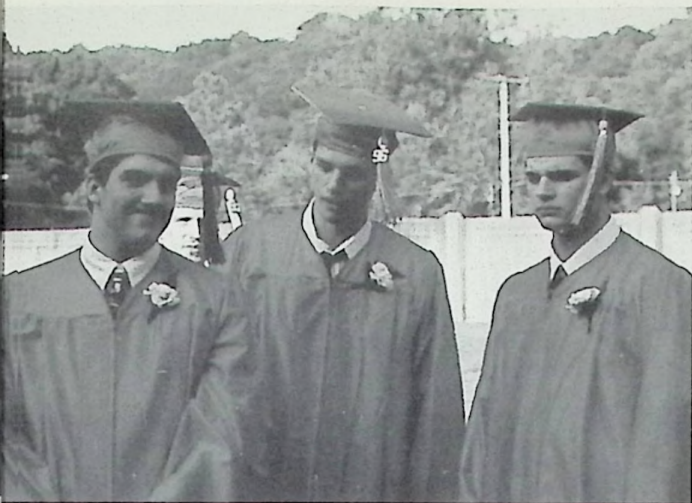

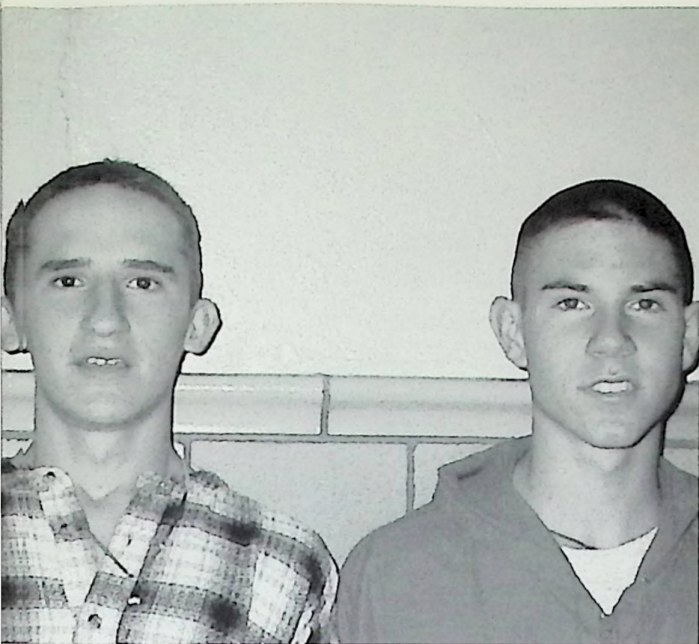

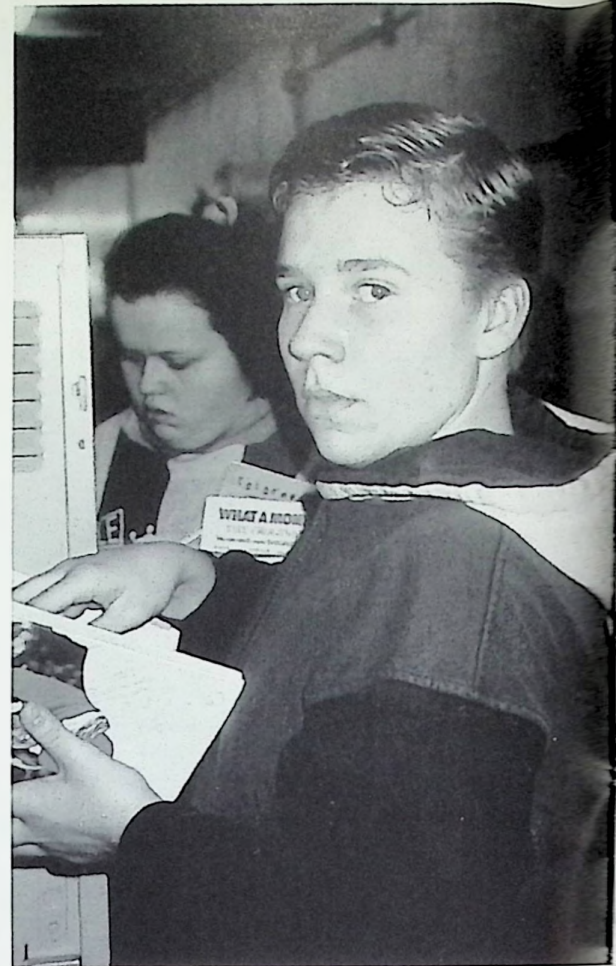
Class of '98

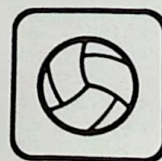

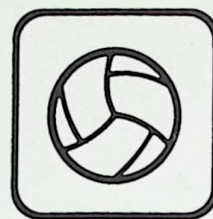

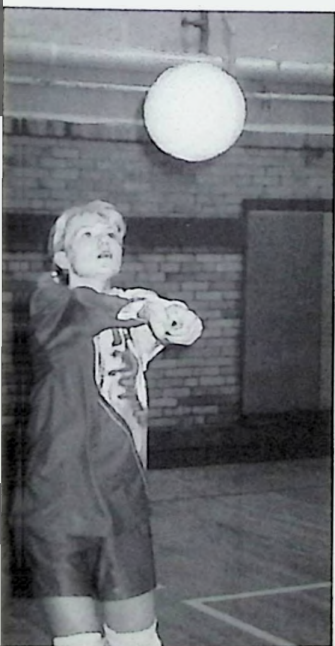

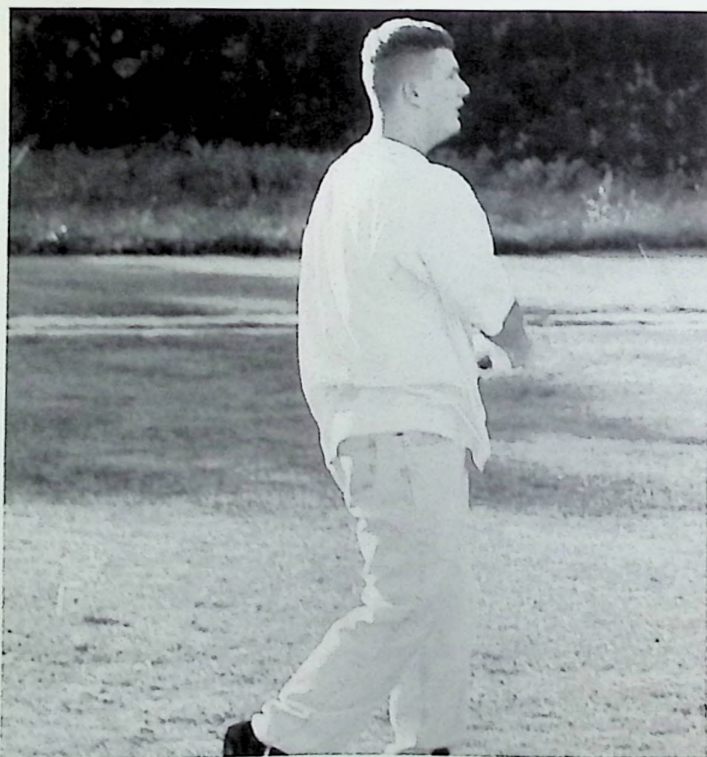

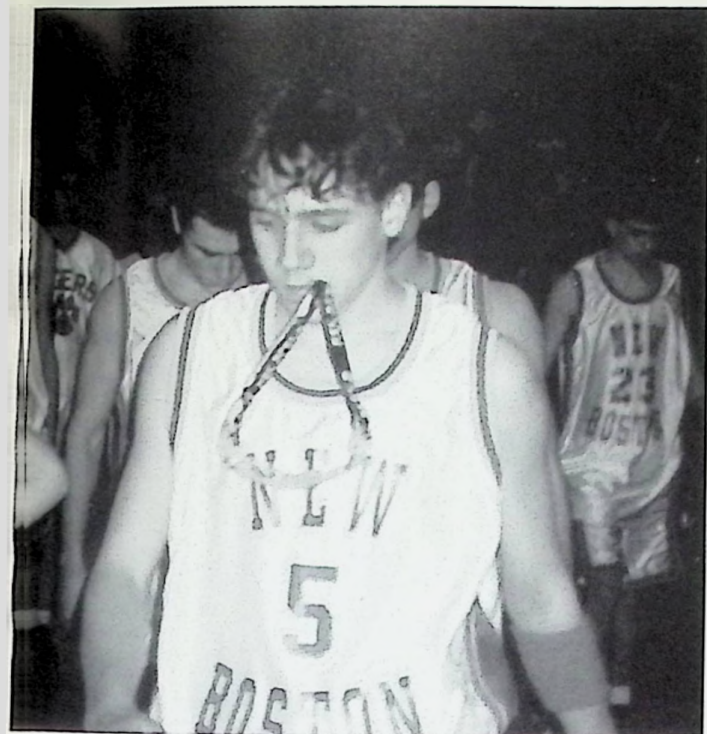

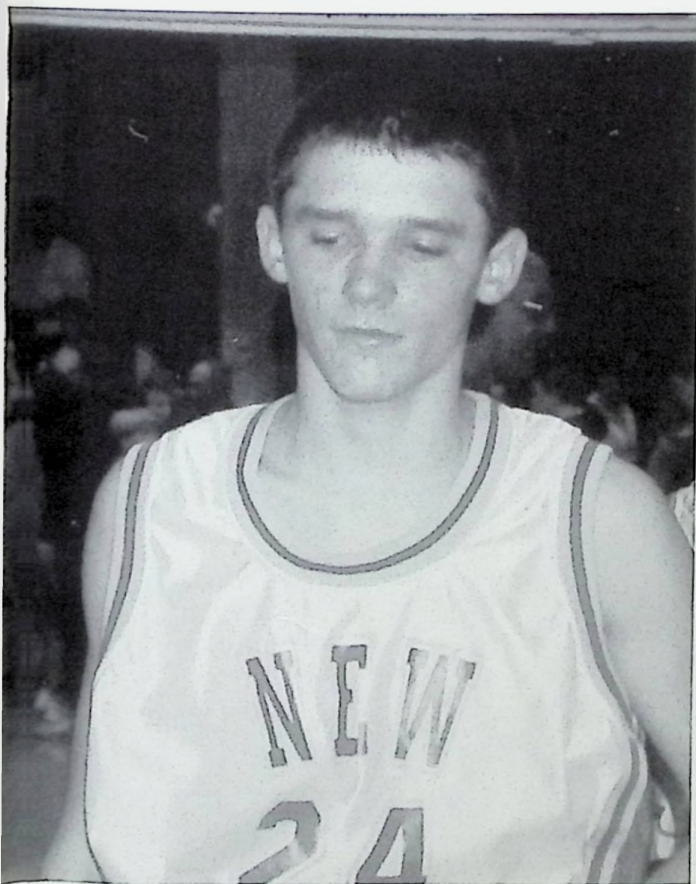

Although the team only won four games, the season was exciting and Mr. Porter was pleased with the progress his team made.



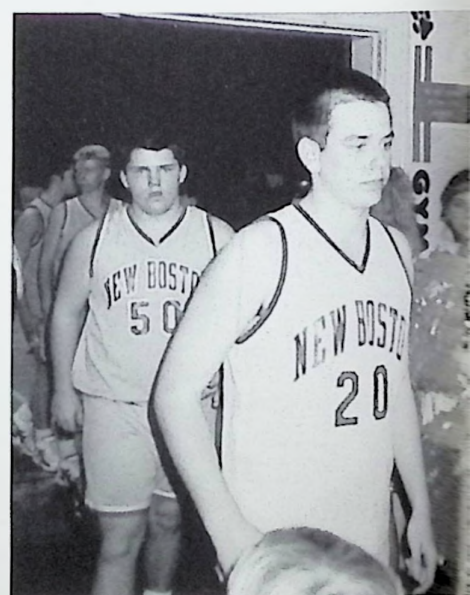

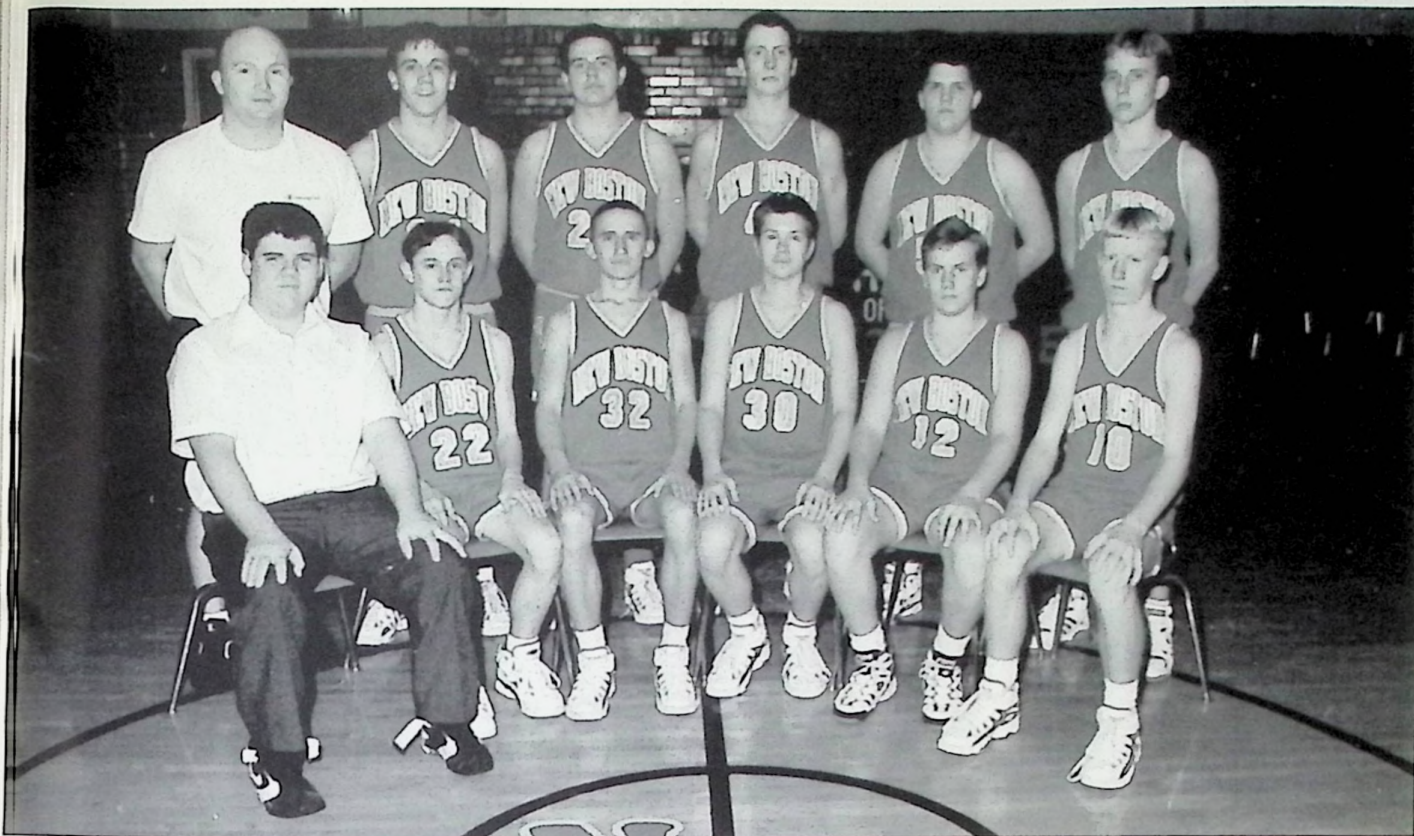

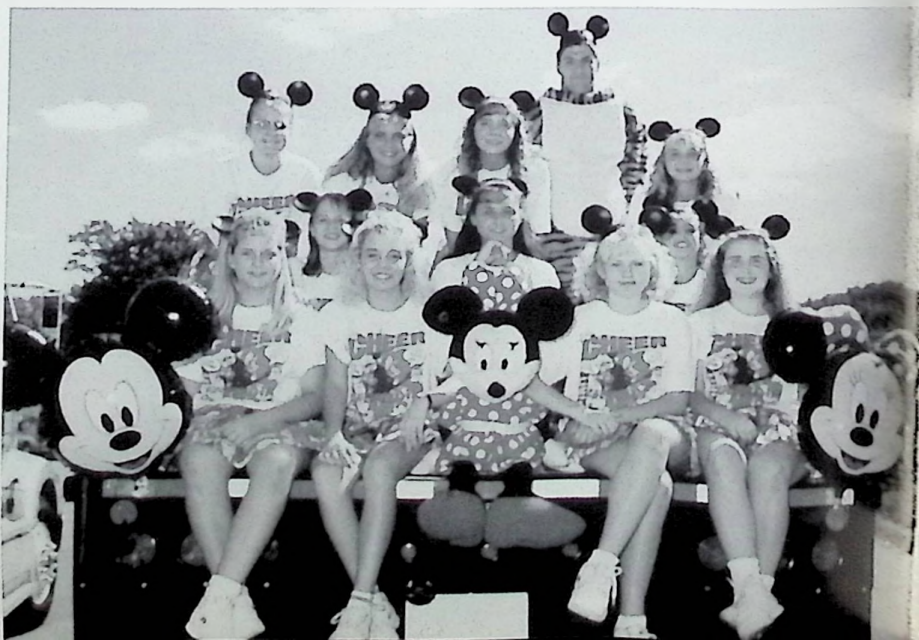

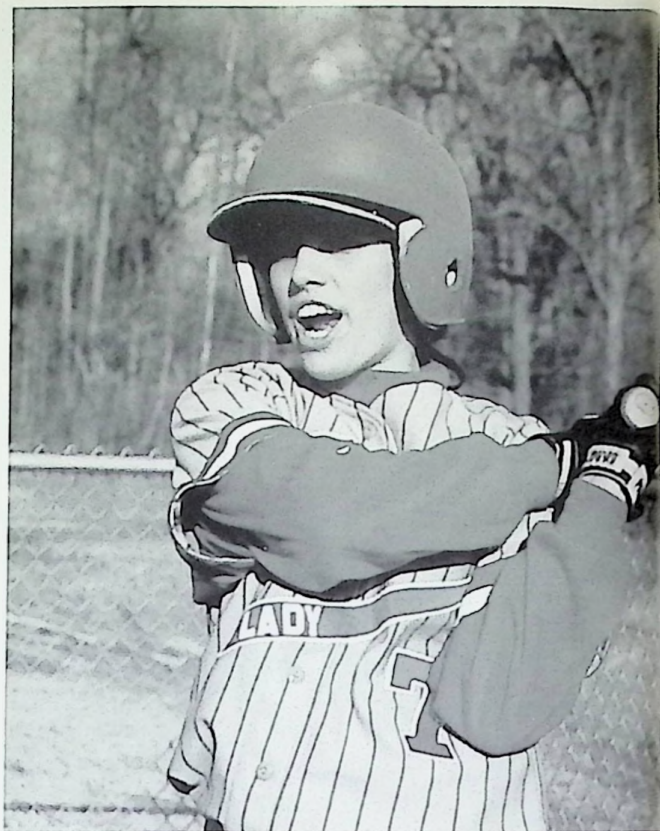

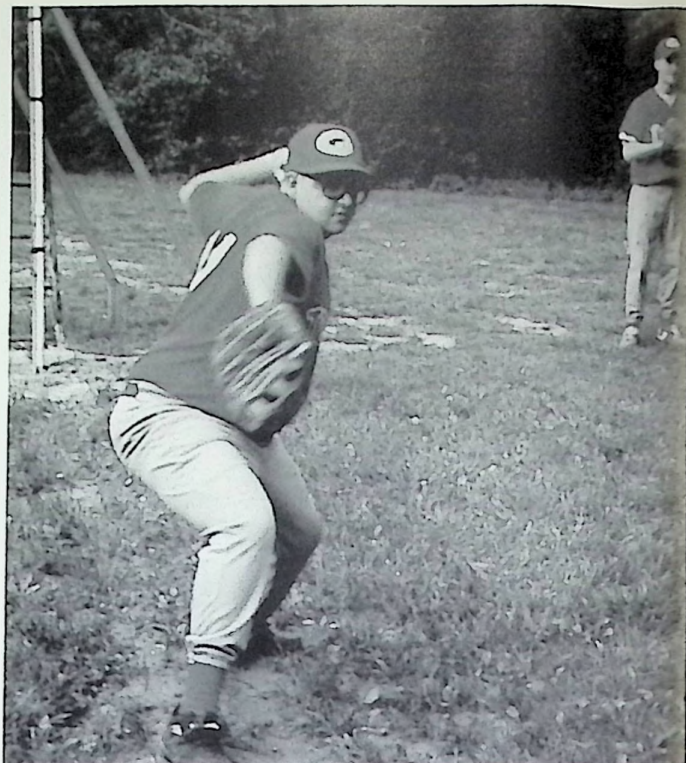

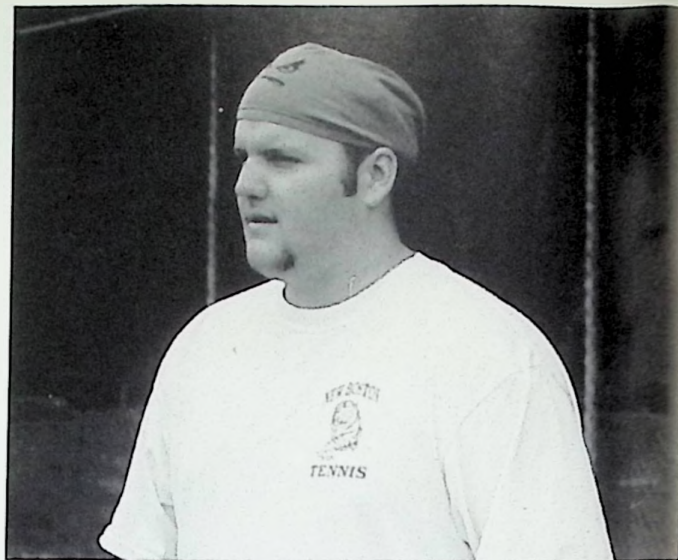

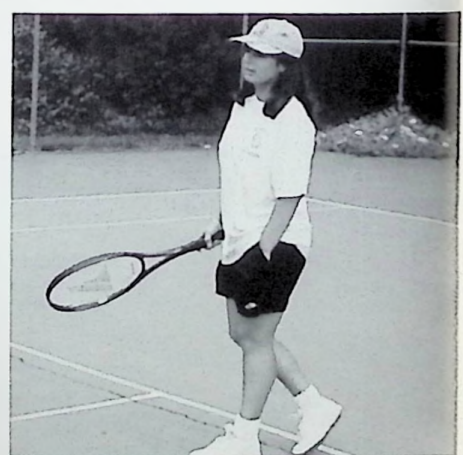

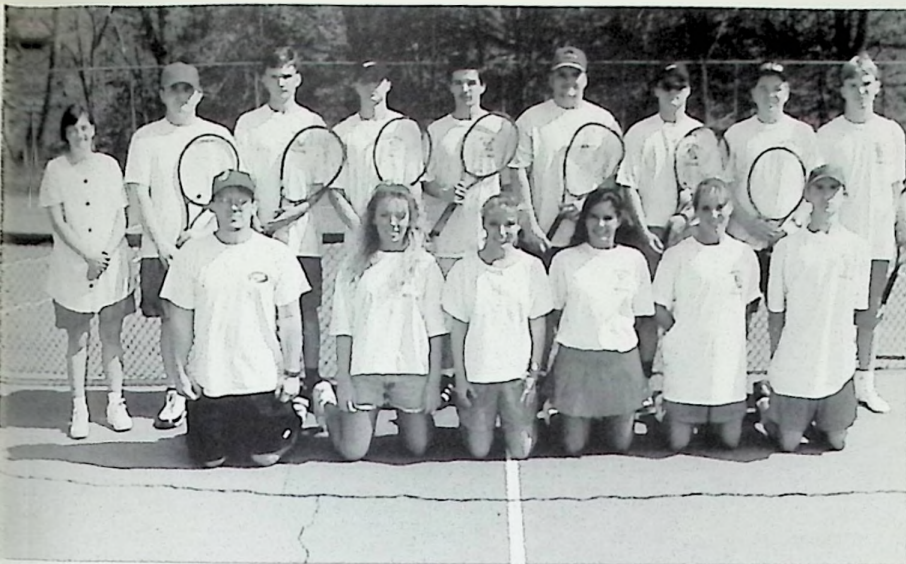

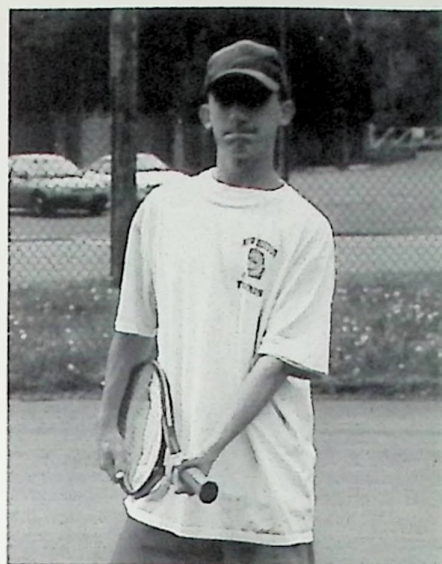

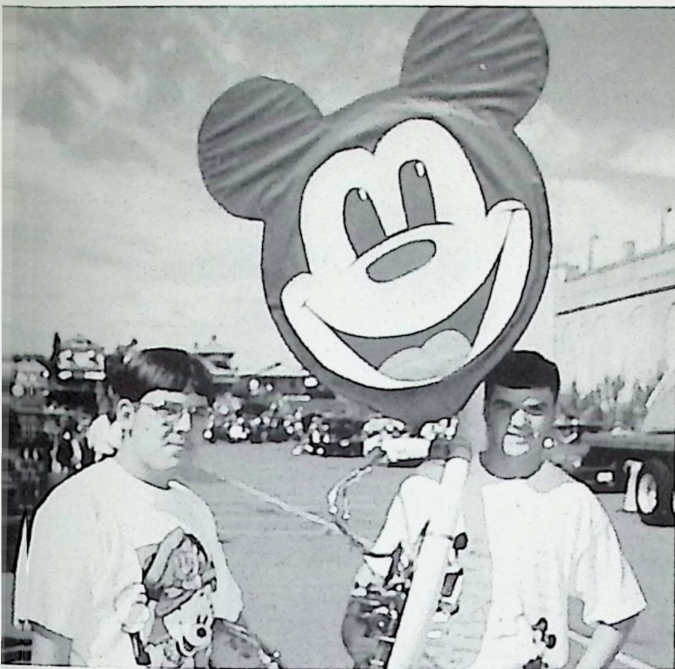

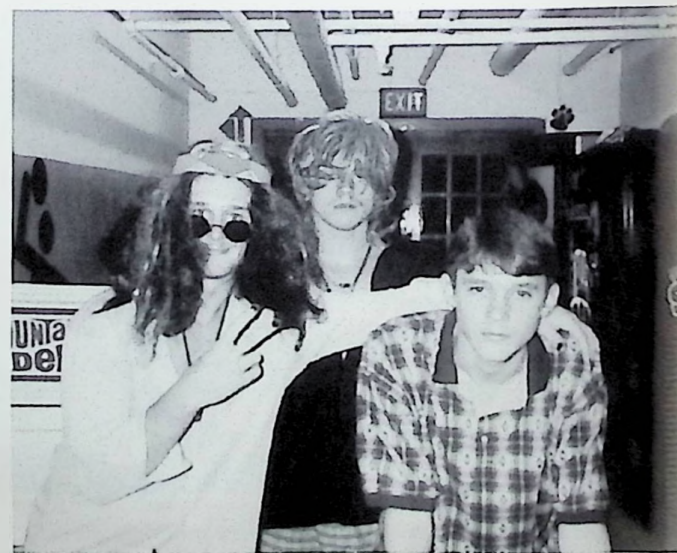

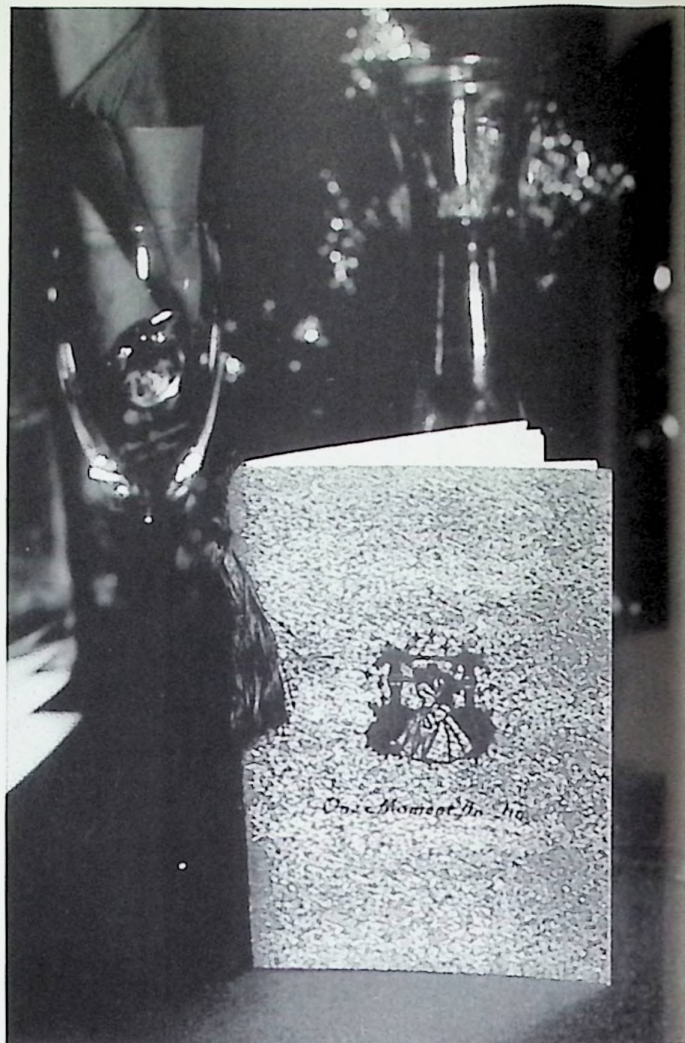

"One Moment in Time" decorated the memory book, glasses and garters that were given as prom favors. The black tablecloths and elaborate place settings created a very elegant dinner table.



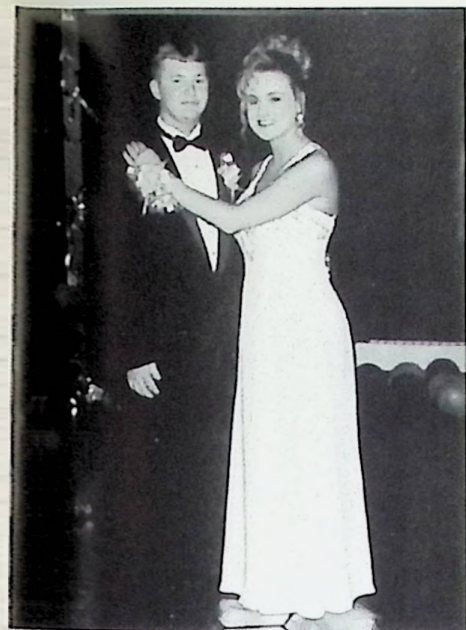

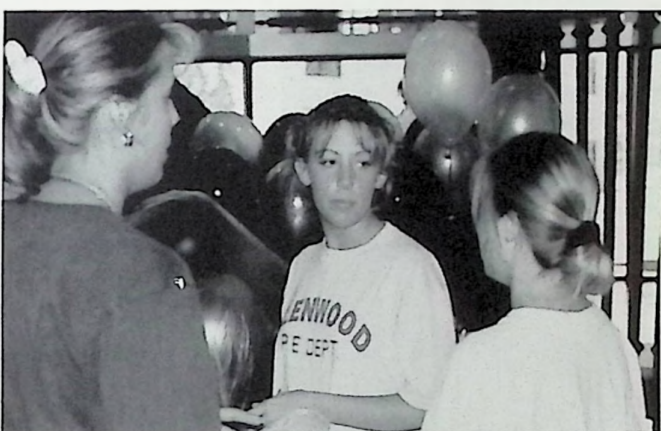

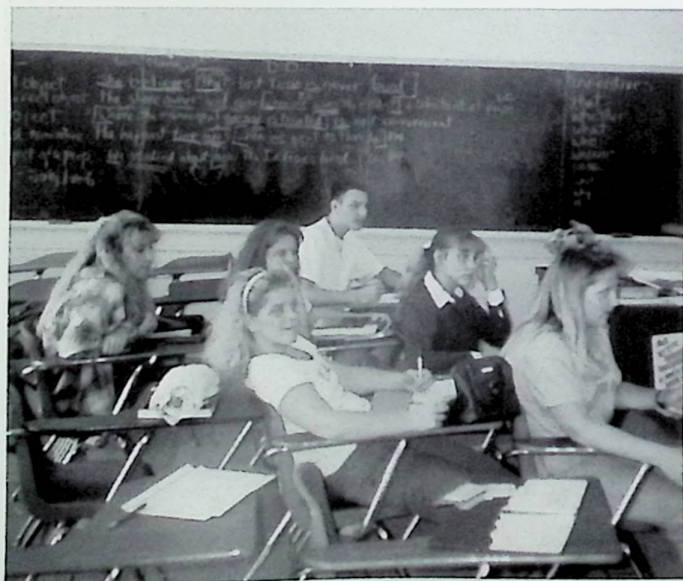
Organizations

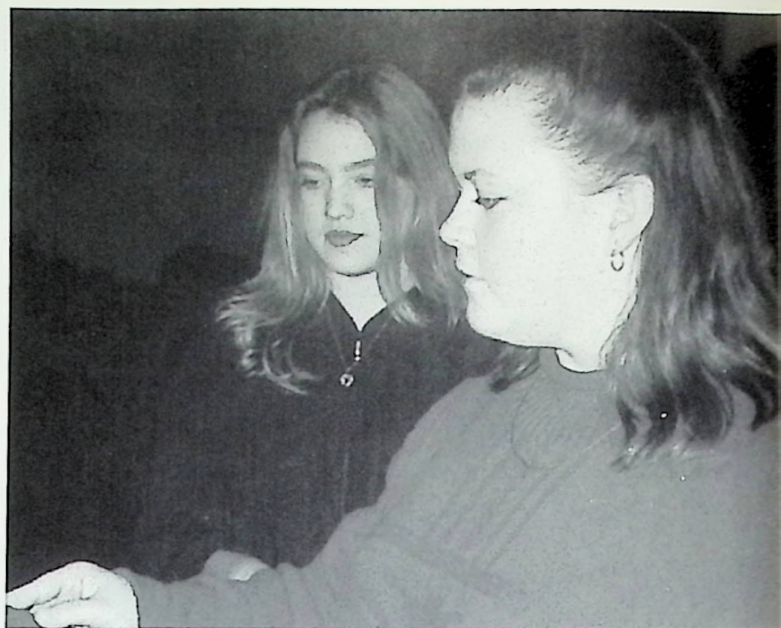

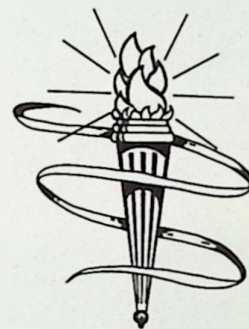

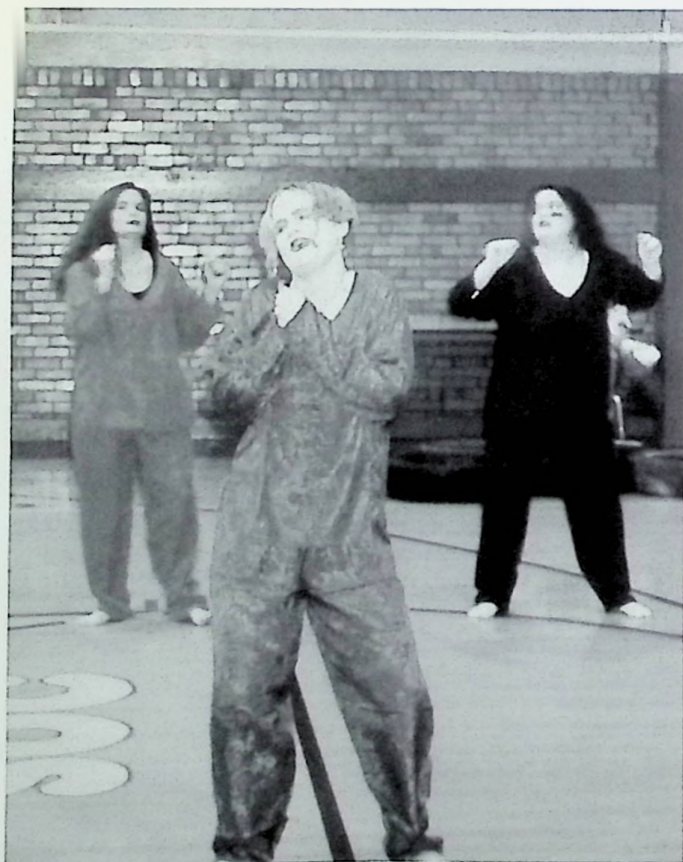

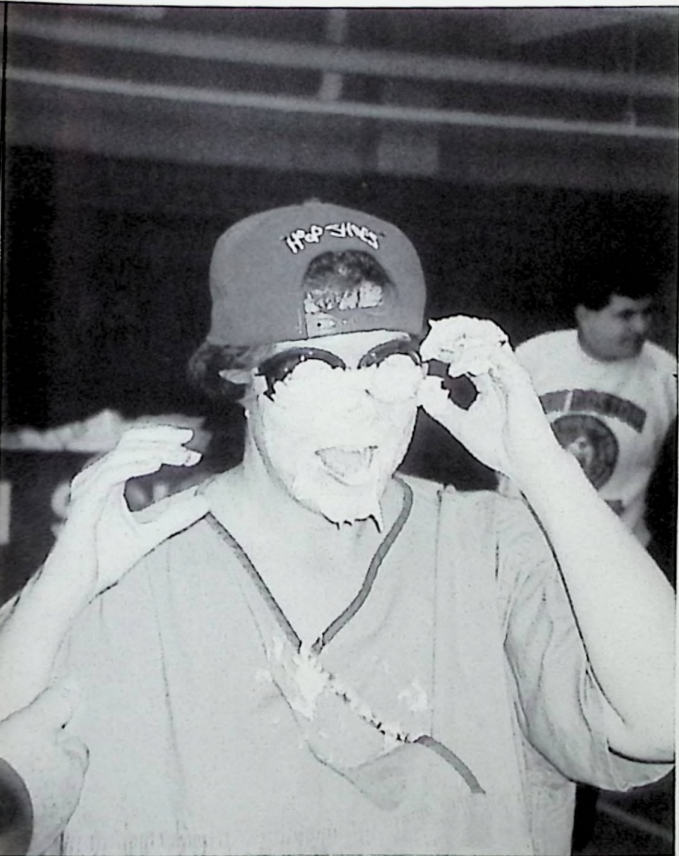

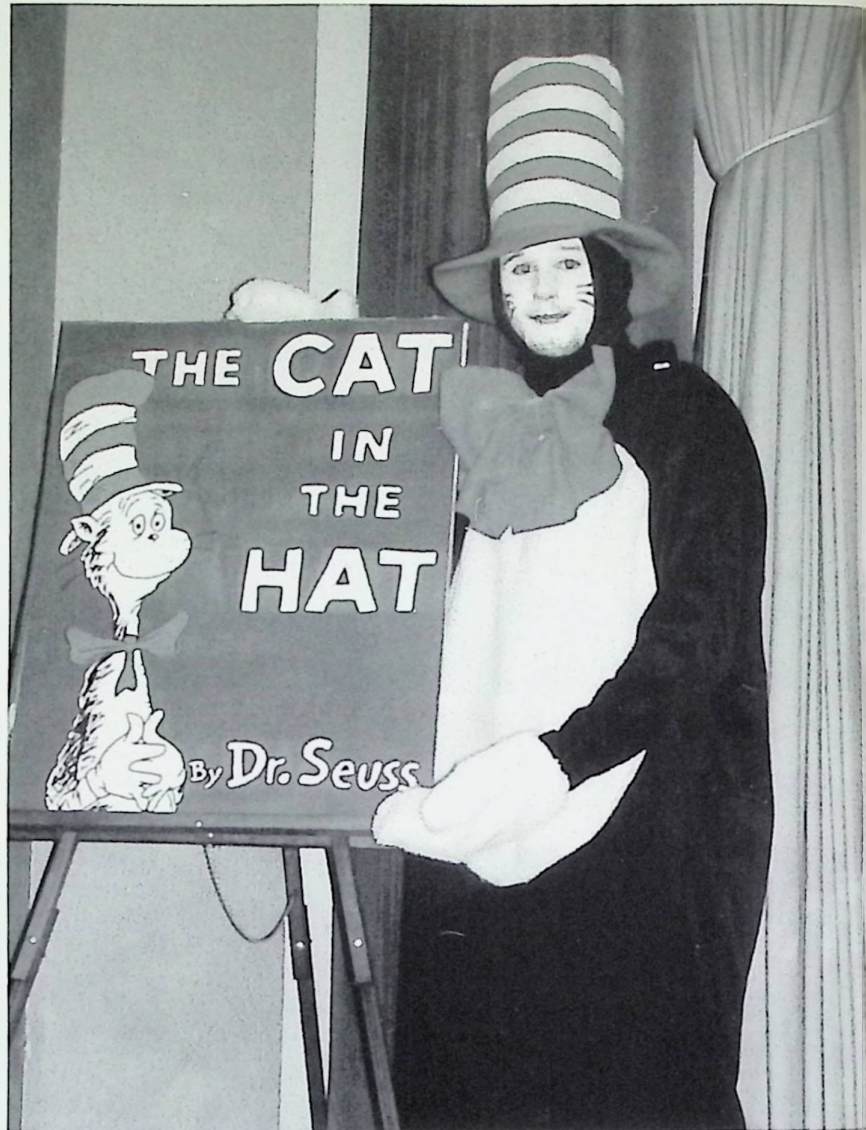

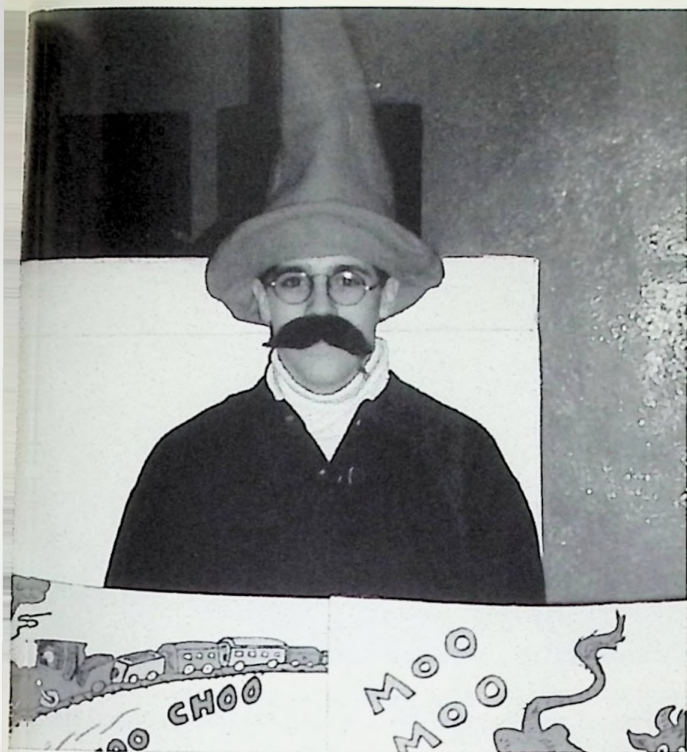

Science NEED

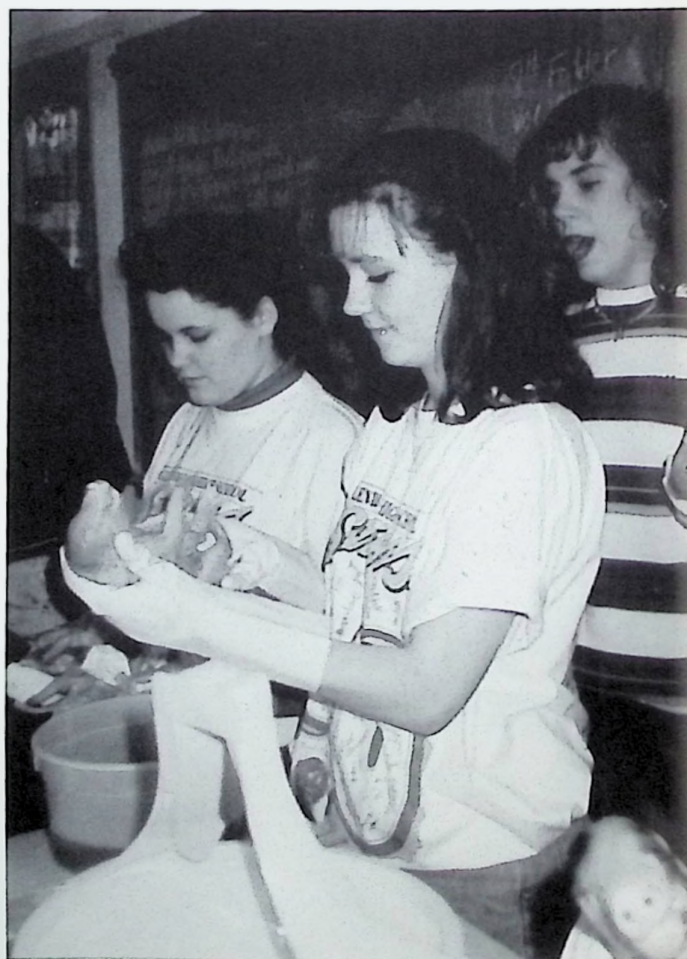

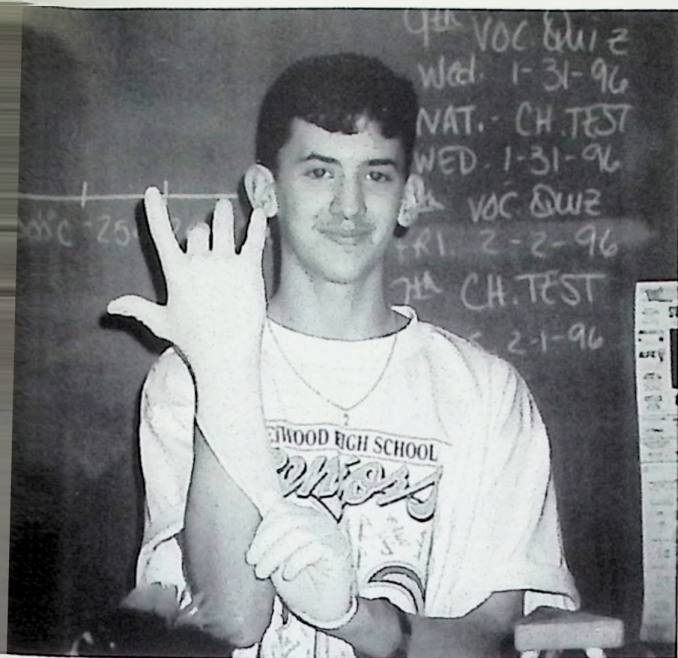

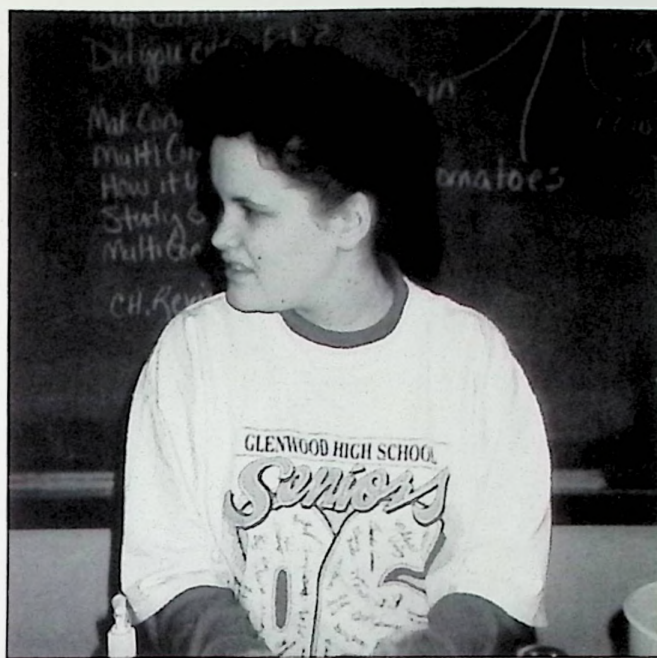

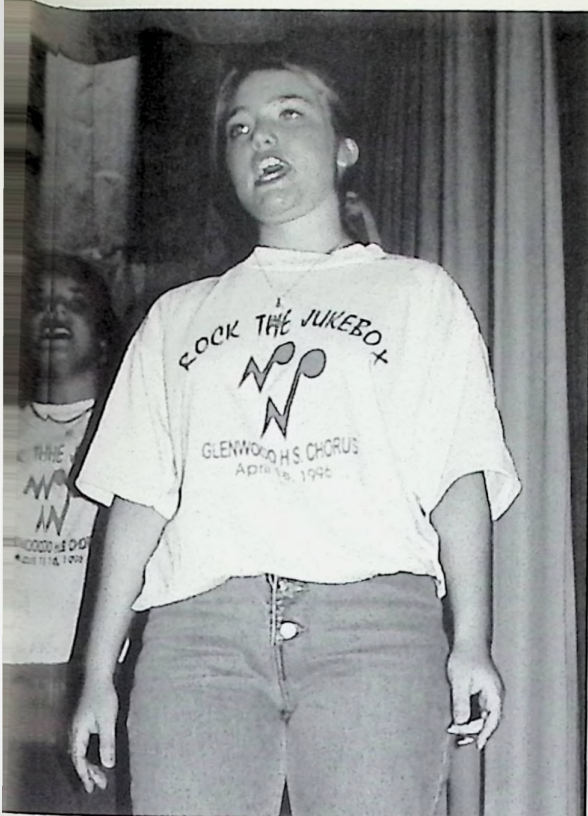

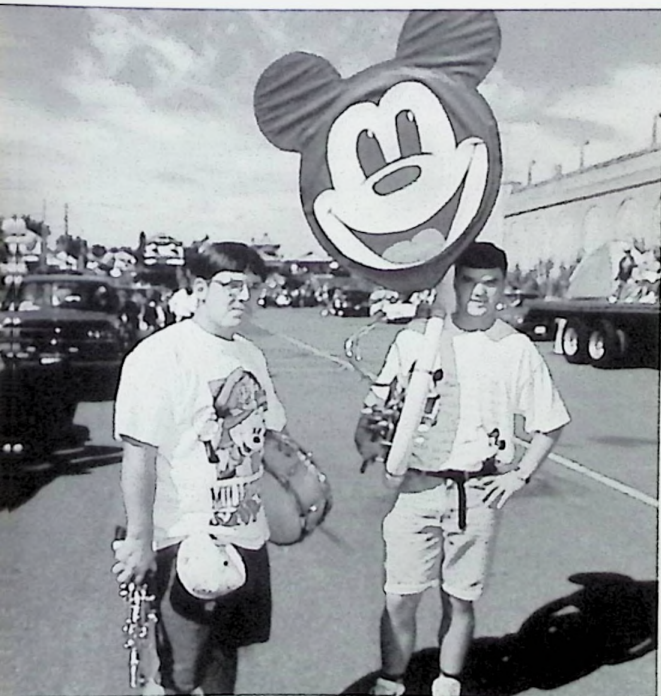

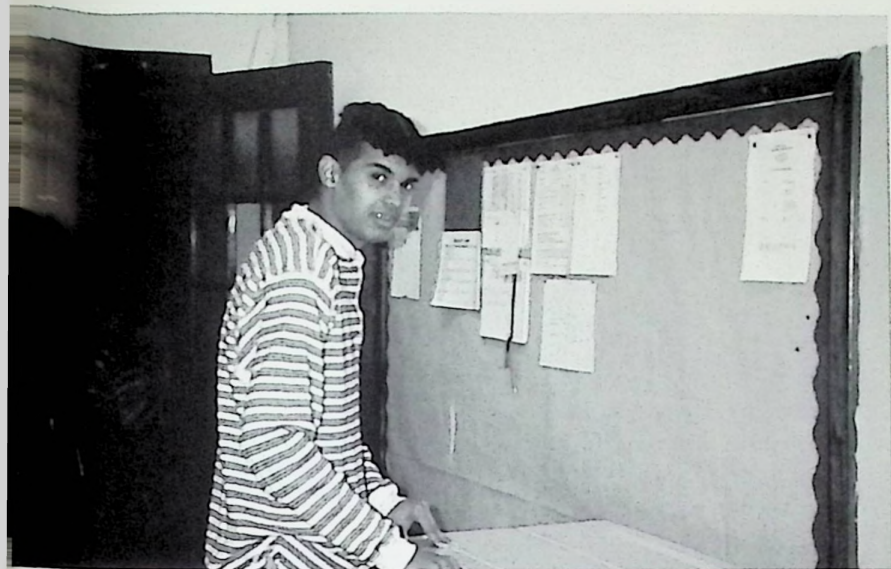

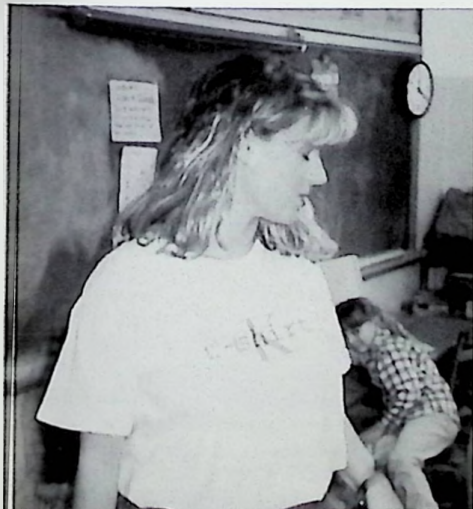

All we can say is you better enjoy your high school years because they will fly by fast, and once they're gone you can never get them back.

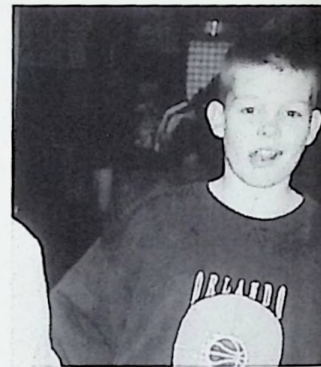

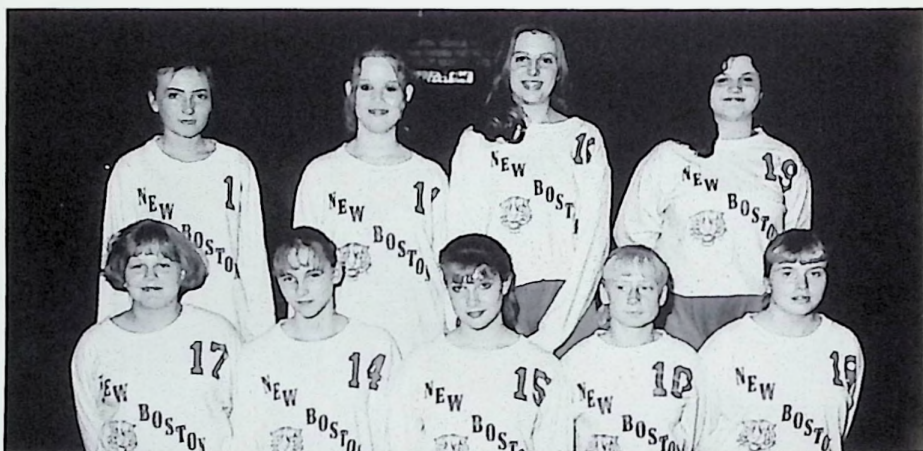
