CLASS HISTORY

In the fall of '43 the Freshman Class, with an enrollment of 80, was divided into two sections under the supervision of Mr. Hull and Mr. Bennett. The following officers were elected: Bob McGlone, President; Eleanore Morris, Vice President; Joy Shoemaker, Secretary; Connie Scott, Treasurer.

During vacation many students found other interests and only fifty-two of the class met as Sophomores, with the following as officers: Kenneth Jenkins, President; Bob McGlone, Vice President; Rosemary Sparks, Secretary; Harold Sparks, Treasurer.

Other activities of the class were Halloween Party, Oct. 28, and the party, March 16, which the girls were obliged to give the boys as a result of a war bond selling contest during the Sixth War Loan Drive.

The Sophomores were well represented in the band, the glee club, and all athletics.

Several of the Sophomores were initiated into the girls' Tri-K Club and boys' Buccaneer Club.

Under the sponsorship of Mrs. Wason, we began as Juniors, with an enrollment of forty-five, a drop of thirty-five since our freshman year. Mrs. Wason left in November and Mrs. Haney was called upon to take charge of us.

As usual, officers were elected to lead us in our activities. Those elected were: Harold Sparks, President; Ed Sexton, Vice President; Kathleen Stevens, Secretary; Joy Shoemaker, Treasurer.

All year we worked toward our final social event of the year; the Junior-Senior banquet. To

make money for this purpose we sold Xmas cards, magazines, pop-corn, and "coke" at basketball games, and chanced off a turkey, "Little Ida."

April 5, we gave a very successful performance of our play "Slightly Delirious," directed by Mrs. Haney. On our social calendar was a Xmas party with the seniors, and a skating party, April 30. Our Junior-Senior banquet was held at the Lake White Club, May 10.

The girls won the Basketball Tournament; the boys the Dodgeball Tournament.

At last, in the fall of '46 forty-one seniors returned to Minford High to complete their high school education and prepare for the future.

Election of officers was the first event with Leonard Downs, President; Harold Sparks, Vice President; Eleanor Morris, Secretary; Donald Bradshaw, Treasurer.

For the year's social events, we had a Xmas assembly, December 29, also a Xmas Party in the evening. A skating party was held, April 15.

During the year, our class participated in District-State scholarship, D. A. R. Citizenship, Prince of Peace, and all athletic activities.

April 25, 1947, our class presented a play, "Soup to Nuts" directed by Mr. P. W. Butcher.

The class climaxed their four years of high school in May by attending the Junior-Senior banquet, May 1; Baccalaureate, May 4; and Commencement, May 6.

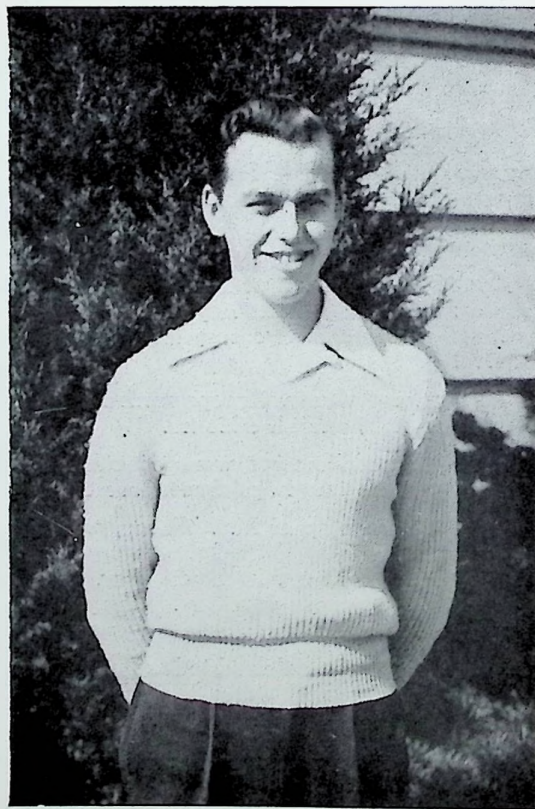

ETHEL FANNIN as an F. B. I. agent and head of the pearl snatching department.

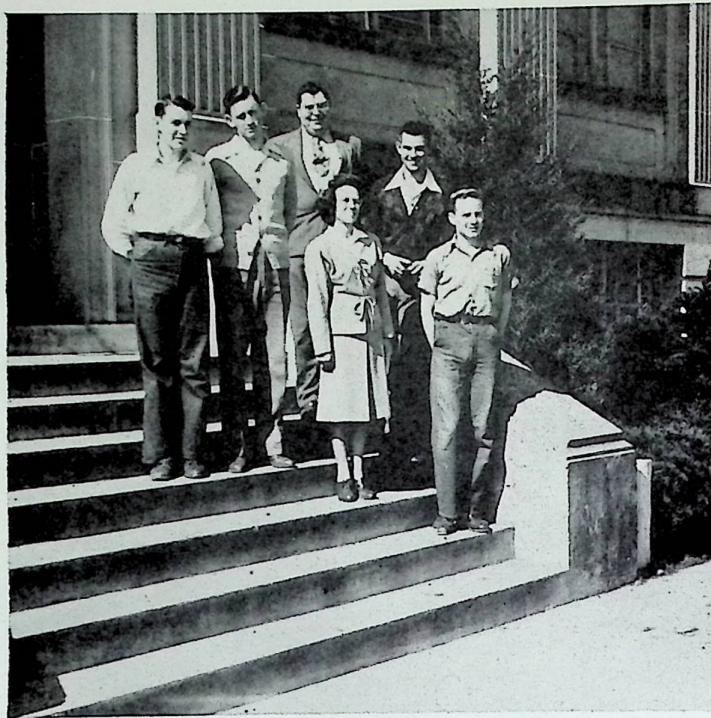
BETTY COOPER'S name in lights on Broadway.

October, found our annual Prince of Peace Contest well under way. Miss Daily and Mr. Butcher had selected nine very capable, but eliminated the group down to seven.

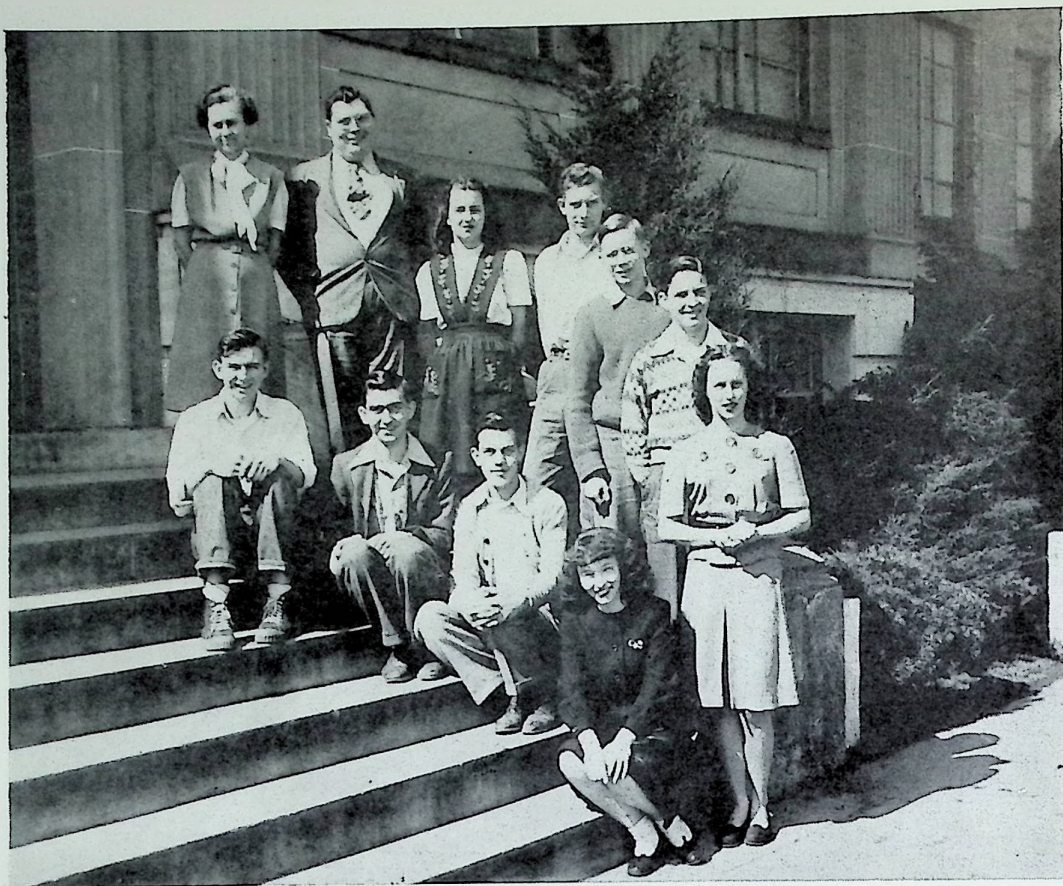
The local contest was held in the Minford Methodist Church, Nov. 11, 1946.

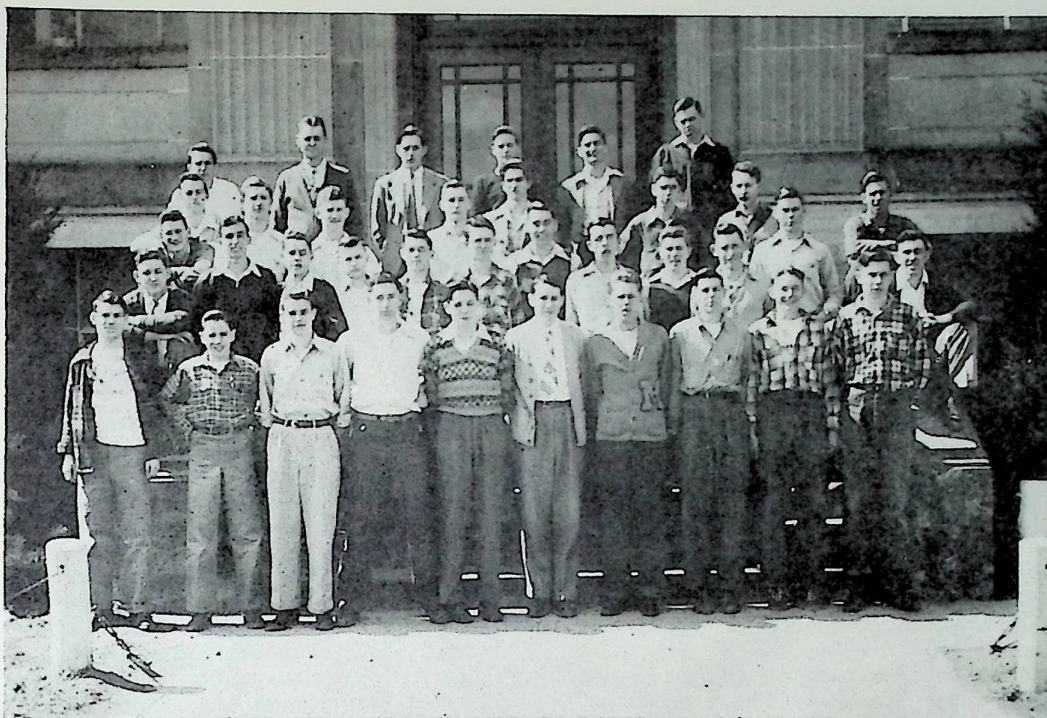
On Feb. 12, Washington came to Minford to debate on the topic "Palestine the Jewish Homeland".

Now, we will go back to the activities, which have come about this year. At the end of our

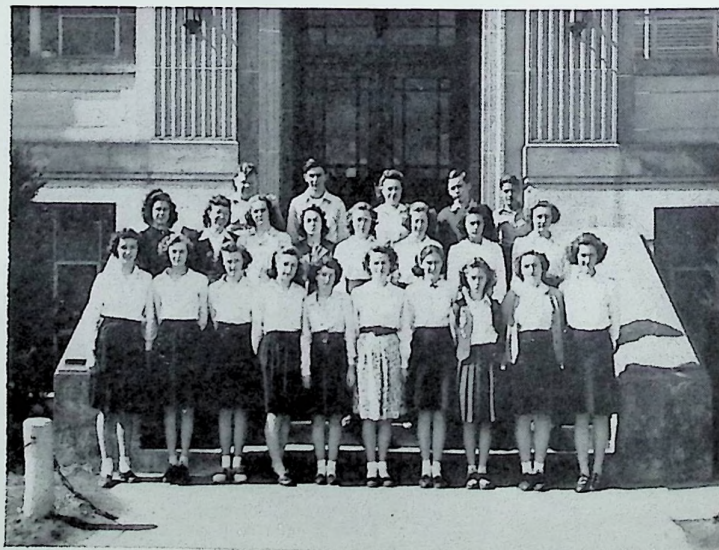
