# 1947 CLASS HISTORY

Once upon a time long, long ago, in the year 1943, in the month of September, which is the ninth month of the year, a new tribe of 'Freshites' came to dwell among the tribes of learning in the Halls of Fame.

William, whose surname was Salyer, Betty Craycraft, Emilie Richendollar and Eula Kennedy were to reign over the thirtyone "Seniorites". They sponsored a play, "The Absent Minded Professor" in which William Wilson Hill played the leading part.

The class gave their heartiest congratulations to Betty Craycraft, Pauline Blanton, Eula Kennedy, and Evalyn South who said "I do" and were taken to be wedded wives.

The "Seniorites" were honored to have six members in the Green Hi Band. They were Omedia Bailey, Betty Rose Moore, George Lavender, Roger Riepenhoff, Mary Martha Thicken, and Johnny Valentine.

As the "Seniorites" neared the end of their adventurous stay in the Halls of Fame, they realized that this was only one small part of the huge world which they were to enter. They decided that life was a serious problem, more serious than they had ever realized in the past. They chose a motto which was to guide them and be remembered during the journeys to come: "Make the Best Better".

## 1946-1947 GREEN BOBCATS

In the County Tournament the Bearcats seemed to have an easy schedule right into the semi-finals. This was their undoing. After easily beating Rarden the Bobcats took on a determined, tall, fast, hard-fighting Minford team. The


Bobcats pulled this one out of the fire in the last two minutes and felt they were in the finals as they had defeated Clay twice before during the season.
